Our mission statement doesn't read "Explore faith. Practice inclusivity. Live justice." on purpose, because while that would be a fine mission statement, it leaves something out. In our congregation, we are already in the process of exploring faith, practicing inclusivity, and living justice, and, our mission calls us to continue to do so. We have been exploring our faith, and we must continue to do so, because how we make meaning in the world, what we believe and value - those are constantly evolving propositions. What I believe to be true about the nature of the world today is a little different than what I believed a year ago, it's a fair bit different than what I believed five years ago, and it's more substantially different than what I believed ten years ago. Likewise, we are living justice because while we have done a significant amount of justice work in our lives and

as a congregation, it is on ongoing process, and there will always be more justice work to be done. And so of course, the same holds true for practicing inclusivity. We've been doing it, and, there is always more work to be done.

The ongoing nature of all three is important to remember, but especially for practicing inclusivity, since that is the easiest to become complacent about. We continue to explore faith and meaning-making at some minimal level by default if we show up for services on Sunday morning, though how we can more fully engage exploring faith is a topic for another time. Living justice is easy - easy at least to recognize just from paying attention to the news and the world around us that there's always more

And that's what can happen to guest and visitors on Sunday mornings if we don't have a strong hospitality team in place burnt out. Fortunately we've had a dedicated team of deacons for orders of service and hymnals are handed out, the offering is collected, and more... and they've done an amazing job. The only problem is, we've been relying, especially the past couple of years, on a very small group of people to be responsible for making sure all of this gets done – and they are getting of Trustees know that they no longer consider the current model viable moving forward. Sacred Text

Our "sacred text" for this month is an excerpt from <u>What</u> <u>If? Short Stories to Spark Diversity Dialogue</u> by Steve L. Robbins:

Crucial conversations... [are the] conversations we shy (often run) away from because they may cause mental discomfort, as if a little cognitive dissonance every now and then were a bad thing. And yet these conversations are the very ones required to overcome our apparent inability to reconcile unity with diversity, uniqueness with uniformity, certainty with curiosity. Crucial conversations, though difficult, are required if we are to hurdle a big obstacle we face on the diversity and inclusion journey: the difference between what we *think* we know and what we *actually* know. They are needed if we decide that *e pluribus unum* is truly our desired state.

We tend not to have crucial conversations around issues of diversity and inclusion because we often lack certain requisite skills. Among those skills is the ability to temporarily suspend our beliefs and worldview to nonjudgmentally entertain the beliefs and worldviews of others. We find it arduous to consider that biased material may have been the basis of our socially constructed reality, our truth. When confronted with undeniable evidence that our truth is only one among many valid perspectives (or that our truth is flat-out wrong), we have an uncanny ability to continue believing that our perspective can be the only truth. Clearly, we don't practice these types of conversations much, and thus we aren't very good at them.

From the Committee on Ministries

Ministry is the broad work of our congregation. Everything we do is part of our ministry to one another and to the community, both within the church and beyond. The work of our Mission and Vision Task Force last year has given us a strong base against which to assess how well we are working together to serve the mission of this congregation.

The Committee on Ministries is charged with helping the ministry teams within the congregation reflect on and assess our work. Our focus on Rev. Seth the first year and our broad assessment of all our ministry teams last year have allowed us to begin more focused work this year devoted to programmatic issues.

Our focus is not on individuals but on the structures through which we work. What are the role expectations and lines of accountability for different ministry teams and leaders? How well do our committees and task forces further our mission? How well do they work together? How well do we communicate—to one another and to the wider congregation—what they do? What can we do better? How can we improve and grow (spiritually, numerically, and/or financially)?

We begin a two-year cycle to address the questions stated above for each of our committees:

In an initial meeting early this fall with each UUCM committee listed for 2015-16, a CoM liaison will provide feedback pertinent to the committee's work gathered through our focus groups and survey last year, discuss the committee's 2015 annual report self-evaluation and the UUCM Mission and Vision statements as guidance for their goals and work 2015-16, and ask what information they would like us to gather for their particular ministry this year. In the spring we will gather information, relying on

the Board come up with a new plan, with the current model remaining in place until the end of October.

Thus with tremendous gratitude to the current group of deacons for their service, the Board has undertaken the task of reorganizing the Hospitality Committee, to better serve the needs of all church members, as well as our guests and visitors. After some quick research, we have decided to implement a system, beginning in November, that has six teams, one each representing the different colors of the rainbow. The teams will rotate responsibility for Sundays, so each team will only be responsible for the current deacons' duties once every six weeks. We'll start with the Red Team being responsible for a Sunday, then the Orange Team, then Yellow, and rotate right on through.

The Board is currently hard at work recruiting Captains for each of these teams, so if a Board member approaches you, please consider saying yes to their request. More importantly, to avoid burning out this new group, we are asking the entire congregation – that means you – to sign up to be on one of the teams to support the Team Captain on a given Sunday. The hope is that we'll have at least 12 or 15 people on each team, so that while the Team Captains will be "on" every six weeks, the team members will only need to help every other time their team comes up in the rotation, or *once every three months*.

And so the request to everyone is — when you see the sign-up sheets for the new Hospitality Teams, please sign up. While we've been incredibly lucky to have this dedicated group of deacons taking care of hospitality on all of our behalves for the past couple of years, we now need everyone to pitch in to make sure the coffee is made, the orders of service get handed out, and everything gets cleaned up afterwards. The deacons have not been doing this all alone, of course, folks have been pitching in all along the way and we're grateful for that help, but we're trying to formalize the process, make it more organized, and get the entire congregation involved. There will be more details to come, but the main point is that we need everyone to participate.

Chipping in once every three months to make sure guests, visitors AND our fellow church friends and members have a great experience on Sunday mornings seems like a pretty reasonable request to us, and we hope you agree. Please help us continue to offer amazing hospitality to visitors and to each other, as we move forward with our new Hospitality Team.

social justice work to be done. But for folks like us who are generally on the liberal side of things, we can sometimes fall into the trap of resting on our laurels a bit when it comes to practicing inclusivity. It's easy for us to say, in our vision statement, that "We welcome people of all identities, regardless of age, class, culture, race, ableness, gender identity, or sexual orientation." It can be harder to remember, sometimes, that we still have work to do, that we might need to do some things differently, if we're going to truly continue our practicing of inclusivity. It can be hard to remember, when "we're already so liberal and welcoming," that yes, there is indeed more work to be done.

Part of the challenge is that we don't always recognize where we might be being less inclusive. Because most of the time, if we recognize that we're not being inclusive, we do our best to correct course almost immediately, given that inclusivity is one of our core values. For example, I try to pay attention to the kinds of examples I use and stories I tell in sermons because as clear a supporter as I am of the LGBTQ community, if I only ever share stories and examples in my sermons about heterosexual couples, that is going to be noticeable to folks who are gay, and make them feel excluded, even though I would certainly have no ill intent. The deeper challenge is the "things we don't know we don't know." So I know that I need to include multiple types of couples in my sermons to be inclusive of the LGBTQ community, but the challenge for me lies in the areas where I don't realize that I might inadvertently be being exclusive. For example, it was recently brought to my attention by one of the pagan members of our congregation that while I have been trying to explore a range of theological positions in my sermons along the atheist-theist spectrum, that I haven't talked much at all about polytheism. Not my intent to exclude those folks, and yet I have been, without being aware.

So this is the challenge for all of us. We proclaim we practice inclusivity, and we do our best, which is usually pretty good. We're certainly much better at practicing inclusivity than many other religious institutions which claim to do so. And, practicing inclusivity is included in our mission statement for a reason. It wouldn't be there if we had done everything we could ever possibly do to be inclusive, if we didn't have ongoing inclusivity work that we needed to tackle. Now, it can be uncomfortable, especially when we think of ourselves as being inclusive, to have areas pointed out to us where our

thinking or behavior might actually be falling short of what we would hope. I know it certainly has brought up feelings of defensiveness for me at various points when it's pointed out to me that I'm being exclusive, despite my best attempts to be otherwise. It can be downright uncomfortable to have to have these types of things pointed out to us. And so I hope, as we continue the hard work of actively practicing inclusivity as individuals and as a congregation, that we can lean into those feelings of discomfort when we find out that we have more work to do in some areas, so that we can take whatever steps forward we need to make sure that everyone, regardless of their identities, feels like they belong in our religious community.

We've done much amazing work, we're continuing to do great things, and, there is always more to be done. I'm so glad to be on this journey with all!


