Discovering Grace

Grace, our theme for November, is not a time. I didn't make it to church in word or concept that I gave much theological weight to for a long time, since most of the concepts of grace I heard were of the kind where some anthropomorphic god I didn't believe in bestowed favor from on high. Typically, if someone brought the topic of grace up in conversation, my response was likely to have been along the lines of, "Grace? Yeah, I don't really believe in that." And then about fifteen years ago, I experienced a moment of grace, a moment that made me re-think my definition.

The transformation came when I was co-teaching an Our Whole Lives sexuality class to a group of 5th and 6th graders. Classes were always held on Sunday afternoons after church, and on this particular Sunday, I was a wreck. I don't even remember why I was a wreck now, but I was an emotional mess at the

time, and I didn't make it to the start of our class in time. In fact, not only did I "not make it on time," I showed up, without having called, about forty five minutes into the hour long session, leaving my co-facilitator Elaine by herself, to teach a class we had prepared as a two-person team. And I wasn't much use for the 15 minutes I was there either. I sat in my chair and was physically present, but that was about it. Elaine noted my arrival, and proceeded to finish teaching the class without comment. Once class ended, the kids started filing out, and I anticipated an onslaught. I braced myself for the angry questions and accusations I was sure were about to be hurled my way. Shoulders hunched, walls up as the last kid left the room - I was prepared for the

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A Life, Graced

I turned 70 last month. That gave me quite a bit of pause for reflection. I'll begin drawing Social Security. At 70 ½, I have to begin taking required minimum distributions from my IRA. I believe that means the government is actively contemplating my demise, based on the mysterious calculations of those professionals known as actuaries.

And then there are the physical and mental challenges that Bill Sinkford alludes to in his essay, "Rise in Body or in Spirit" (in Kathleen Montgomery's edited volume, Landscapes of Aging and Spirituality). I have, for example,

taken the American Association of Retired People course for elderly drivers, specifically designed to counter the limitations of age. Mr. Sinkford notes the expression, "Seventy is the new fifty." He then goes on to say "Yes... and no. There is most certainly life, love, and productivity at seventy and well beyond. But we are dealing with changes too... Aging is about decreased ability, increased limitation... Aging is about the acceptance of approaching death." His words ring true for me.

Sacred Text

Our "sacred text" for this month is titled "Eyes as Clear as Centuries" by Ann McCallister:

It is said that grace can be "an unexpected, undeserved good." I feel resistance to the idea that grace is ever undeserved, probably because in the work I do as an attorney, I represent convicted murderers, abusers, burglars, car thieves, drug dealers, etc., all of whom, whether guilty or innocent, need as much grace as possible to give them another jumpstart to hopefully connect with their higher selves and heal.

My belief is that the universe is benevolent in an impersonal way – that grace is the high vibration of manifested love that weaves in and out of our lives, nourishing us especially when we are not consciously aware that we need it. The gift that simply happens just when we are mired in some feeling that life sucks, and then, we serendipitously come across the amazing face of a baby with "eyes as clear as centuries" as Paul Simon sang in "Born at the Right Time." And afterwards, we realize we don't feel the same way.

Our new mission statement begins by calling us to a continuing exploration of our faith. In pursuit and support of that goal, we are expanding our Adult R.E. offerings during the Sunday morning 9:30 am-10:30 am pre-service slot. Check out all the offerings below!

Exploring Spiritual Practices

1st Sundays – Yellow Room

Start your month off by investigating a spiritual practice that you may want to make a part of your everyday life. **Rev. Julia** will lead an adult RE offering based on U.U. minister Scott W. Alexander's book, *Everyday Spiritual Practice* (Skinner House, 1999). We'll discuss one or two of his suggestions for different spiritual disciplines and then you'll have the intervening month to put into practice what appeals to you. Engaging in regular spiritual practice is one way we can explore our faith. It's also a good way to strengthen ourselves for practicing inclusivity and living justice. We'll proceed in the spirit of exploration and discovery, without judgment.

What Moves Us: Unitarian Universalist Theology

2nd Sundays – Yellow Room

Our theology is rich and powerful. Join Rev. Elizabeth to explore what makes Unitarian Universalist theology so life giving and transformative. Together, we will dive into a beautiful and experiential curriculum created by the UU theologian Rev. Dr. Thandeka. We will journey together in faith, through shared direct experiences and reflection exercises, readings and lessons, and ethical deliberations. Sessions will build on one another, though new participants may join at any time.

Listening Circles

4th Sundays - Yellow Room

Two of the Pastoral Associates facilitate our new Listening Circles group on the 4th Sunday of the month in the Yellow Classroom. Our Pastoral Associates are a group of trained and committed lay people who diversify and expand the pastoral ministry of our church. Listening Circles, based on a model of speaking and listening that affords everyone a safe space in which to speak from their heart, offer us the opportunity to strengthen our faith and form deeper relationships with each other. Confidentiality and emotional safety are paramount. This is a place where you can share your personal feelings and innermost thoughts with others in a safe environment. You do not have to participate every month; come when you can and when you have something you wish to share with an open, respectful group of listeners.

Pre-Service Discussion

Every Sunday – Red Room

Our Sunday morning mainstay continues. This group is meant as a chance for people with various personal beliefs to get together and openly discuss a variety of topics. A different leader each week presents the topic and tells us some main points and history, usually lasting about 10-15 minutes. Then we discuss the topic for the rest of the hour, with a moderator helping guide the discussion and making sure everyone gets a chance to talk. Our discussions usually focus on issues of morality, ethics, knowledge, personal responsibility, and applying UU Principles to daily life. All interested adults are welcome – there's no signing up; just come for subjects that sound interesting you or come for them all!

Muncie UU Pagans

Every Sunday – Violet Room

This is an open discussion group to explore the differences in our pagan traditions. We will also be discussing the reasons that so many Pagan and Earth based religions find a home in a UU congregations. In the UU spirit of loving and inclusiveness, people of any belief are welcome to attend.

Adult Religious Exploration

Rev. Seth's Sunday afternoon Adult Religious Education offerings have returned this year, again meeting on a monthly basis for the 2015-2016 church year.

Theme Reflection

The Theme Reflections group will hold our third meeting on Sunday, November 1st, from 12:30-2 pm in Rev. Seth's office, during which we will use a connection group model based on deep listening to explore November's theme of Grace. You do not need to have attended a prior class to come this month, but you will need to bring or go get your own lunch prior to the class starting.

Exploring Your Theology

The Exploring Your Theology class will meet Sunday, November 8th, from 12:30-2 pm, in the Yellow Room. Since our beliefs and theology are constantly evolving, it's good to spend some time every now and then exploring, and hopefully growing and evolving, our beliefs and value systems. Like the Reflections class, you will need to provide for your own lunch during the downtime between the service and the start of the class. We will cover different topics this year than we did last year, so if you came last year and would like to participate again, please feel free to do so.

Screening of the Movie "Selma" Sunday, November 15th, 1-4:00 pm



As we see all to frequently in the news, racism is still a problem in our country, in all sorts of different ways. Our church's Anti-Racism Task Force was founded last year to see how we as a religious community could, and should respond. A public screening of the movie Selma, after church on Sunday, November 15th, at 1:00 pm, in the sanctuary, will be our first event this year. The film documents the struggles of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and other leaders as they organized demonstration marches from Selma to Montgomery, Alabama, in 1965, in their ultimately successful effort to gain voting rights for blacks in the United States. Please join us for this special screening, and then stay afterwards for an hour of small-group dialogue reflecting on our experience of the film, and what it means for us today in our ongoing fight against racism, facilitated by members of the Anti-Racism Task Force.

The logistics: popcorn and soda will be available for a nominal charge, \$3 gets you one of each. There is no admission charge for the event, but a free will offering would be accepted to help offset expenses. The movie is approximately two hours long, and we'll plan on keeping the small group discussions to an hour, so we should be done by 4.

Questions on the 2015-16 Budget

Some questions were raised after the Congregational meeting last Sunday, October 18, 2015.

Regarding a question about the 2015-16 Budget, the Finance Committee had decided that the Congregational approval on 4/19/15 of the loan for the Solar Panels and Congregational approval on 8/9/15 of the loan for the roof repairs constituted approval of the related changes to the budget.

The Chair of the Finance Committee, Chuck Austin, presented the financing plan for both of these projects at the August 9 Special Congregational Meeting. The plan showed the loan repayment of \$188 per month for the solar project and \$281 per month for the membrane roof.

Since the Congregation approved the financing plan at the August 9 meeting, the Finance Committee did not believe it would be necessary to approve them again at the October 18 Congregational meeting. The loan payments will appear on the monthly financial statements, which are monitored both by the Finance Committee and the Board.

Regarding the current fiscal year financial statements, the by-Laws require that the year-end reports of the previous fiscal year be presented at the October Congregational meeting. Also, the comparison of the current budget with the previous year budget is done at the May Congregational meeting.

For your information, the Balance Sheet and the Income and Expense Statement as of September 30, 2015, showing actual financial operations for the first quarter of fiscal year 2015-16, is available in the church office for anyone wishing to see a copy. As I will be away for more than two months, Jeff Hathaway and Chuck Austin have kindly agreed to answer any questions you may have on these financial statements.

Installation Progress

With the help of dry sunny weather during the week of Oct. 5, the new PVC membrane roof is almost completely in place (and inspected) – including the entire high roof over the sanctuary. Therefore, after more dry sunny weather during the week of Oct. 12, our solar contractor, Eric Hesher, reported today (Monday, Oct. 19) that most of the components of our solar system – mounting racks, 80 solar panels, and some of the cinder blocks are on the roof and now being carefully aligned, etc. So with a similar forecast for this week, more good progress should be made. It will probably be a couple more weeks before the system can be turned on - after final wiring by a certified electrician, inspection by the City of Muncie

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Worship Associates

From the Committee on Ministries

This is the first in a series of articles about the ministries of our church. Everything we do is part of our ministry to one another and to the community, both within the church and beyond. Each month over the next two years the series will spotlight the work of a committee or task force that contributes to the broader ministry of our congregation.

The Worship Associate's role in each Sunday service makes the team highly visible. Their responsibilities, preparation, and reflection behind the scenes, however, are less visible.

They coordinate with Seth and Julia, sometimes planning well in advance, and are responsible for guiding and coordinating with guest ministers. (Seth invites guest ministers during the year, but Worship Associates are responsible for summer guest speakers, tapping seminaries and speakers who have appeared before.) WAs collaborate with Sights and Sounds and the Directors of RE and Music every Sunday, the entire team meeting before the service to ensure a seamless, coherent service. They also coordinate with Deacons who must ring the bells. Afterwards, they spend half of their 1.5 hour monthly meetings talking about each service to evaluate it in terms of proportion, shape and direction, appropriateness of content, flow, clarity, and inclusivity. They would love feedback for that process!

Reflection and planning also include efforts to increase congregational involvement, like the multigenerational service and the use of monthly themes, and discussion about practices that have been moved out of Sunday services—harvest feat, day of the dead, and the new member ceremony, for example. Our Mission—Exploring faith. Practicing inclusivity. Living justice—informs their reflection and planning: service topics and practices span a variety of faith traditions; chalice lighters are diverse; and social justice is a constant in theme and action. To meet the congregation's needs for audio and visual, the team also did the research necessary to purchase the new projector. To keep the congregation informed, they manage Unigram and Order of Service announcements as well.

Individually, Worship Associates are expected to come to meetings, take their turn (every 6 weeks), help plan summer services, have a good speaking voice (be able to project), follow a script (ad lib only if needed), embrace lots of details (multi-task), not have stage fright, and be adaptable. Once scheduled, a WA looks up chalice lighting words, a meditation, or anything else that might come up

after Seth has suggested the topic. Mentoring new WAs and having them shadow experienced WAs is part of their effort to train each other. (Iris Chalk is now a junior WA, in training.) They clearly need an excel doc to keep everything straight!

What's it like to be a Worship Associate? What's most important? Bea says, "being a WA is a perfect fit for me: challenging, inspirational, but not overwhelming." Bill likes working "with the other WAs and the minister to add value our worship... a key part of what happens at UU." Denise appreciates "the opportunity to share [her] enthusiasm and connect with people during the worship service." Diane enjoys the full process and sharing responsibility for enabling "the congregation to gain the most insight from the words during worship." Lisa says, "Being a WA plays to my organizational strengths as well as appeals to my sense of 'Learn/grow by doing'", so I enjoy collaborating with Seth, Julia, and the other WAs to turn the many Sunday details into a cohesive, meaningful service for the congregation."

As Lisa Kuriscak, the WA chair, noted, "A certain amount of disorganization with all the options open and lots of people involved can be daunting, but the moment when everything comes together is awesome!" She cited two examples of services for which she served as WA: "It's so inspiring to see Julia who likes all the t's crossed and I's dotted to go way beyond her comfort zone to write her own sermon on Radical Trust at 4 in the morning when she'd been asked late Saturday afternoon to substitute for Seth who was ill and was offered one of Elizabeth's sermons to use. But she couldn't just use Elizabeth's—it wasn't hers. And then she also did the story for all ages, which she'd never done before." That service epitomized all the qualities necessary for a WA: follow script, ad lib only if needed, embrace lots of details (multi-task), not have stage fright, be adaptable. Second, in the recent multigenerational service Seth and Nadine planned, Lisa chose to be adaptable and now would happily dance every Sunday with fabric and an inflatable globe.

Discovering Grace

worst. Elaine turned to me and said, "Are you ok?"

If grace can be redefined as receiving unearned, unexpected gifts – that was my experience in this moment, and I can only define it as grace. I felt overwhelmed in the moment by the grace Elaine was offering me, when I felt she had every right to dress me down, and instead, she chose to see if I was ok. Because if the situation had been reversed, I would have been all over her, giving her a hard time for being so late, for not calling, for completely dropping the ball on all fronts. Instead, she just expressed concern for me. Maybe if I was being my best self, I would have asked how she was doing first, but at some point, I would have complained about her irresponsibility. In the entire 15-20 minutes we stayed there after the class, she expressed not one word of frustration to me, she just cared for me.

This example also highlights an important part of this new definition of unearned, unexpected gifts — what is unearned and unexpected is in the eye of the beholder. I'm in a very different place now, fifteen years later, and I'd like to think that if I were in Elaine's shoes now that my response would be more like hers, and less like the criticisms I would have surely offered back then. And so maybe now, if a similar situation were to happen to me again, with my expectations different, I might feel a less powerful experience of grace, or perhaps even not at all. But in that moment, for me, it was an act of grace, and it still feels that way. Elaine's deep care and kindness, her gift of above and beyond in that moment, it still warms my soul to this day.

While I have experienced other moments of grace since then, Elaine's kindness remains the most resonant for me, the one that shifted my perspective. If I had to venture where grace comes from today, I would probably say it has its roots in love, whether that be the love of another human being, or the divine Love energy that infuses the universe. Whatever its source, wherever it comes from, however it comes into being, Elaine shared grace with me in that moment. And all these years later, it still touches my heart, it still blesses my being. As we explore Grace together as our theological theme this month, may you at some point be blessed with grace.

Building Dept., and final inspection by American Electric Power. But things are progressing smoothly – and we will definitely beat the ice and snow!

The Green Team is busy working on how to fulfill some of the obligations described in our solar grant application.

Increasing Energy Efficiency in our Community

Two organizations in Muncie - Home Savers of Delaware County (formerly Rebuilding Together), and Interfaith Earth Care (the Muncie affiliate of Hoosier Interfaith Power & Light) - are co-sponsoring a new program of residential winterization with the twin objectives of A) helping low-income home owners stay in the their homes and keeping them safe, warm, and dry and B) lowering their heating bills and reducing the burning of fossil fuels. Holly Hanauer and the Green Team are actively supporting this effort. A select list of winterization tasks was developed, about seven handy-person trainers/supervisors were recruited and oriented, and "diagnostic" visits to ten or so "candidate" houses in the Whitely neighborhood were made – all in careful preparation for the big implementation day on Saturday, October 24, when teams of volunteers performed the winterization work. We will keep you informed about the program and alert you to the next winterization day, planned for the Martin Luther King holiday weekend.

Educating the Community about Solar and Renewable Energy

A representative of UUCM has been invited by the Hoosier Chapter – Sierra Club to participate in a panel discussion during the stop in Muncie of their Clean Energy Roadshow on Saturday, Nov. 7 (UUCM bazaar day), 1-3 pm. What I find most, however, as I look both back and forward, is that I have, and expect to continue to live a life, *graced*. Graced in so many ways. Along the way, I have come to a sense of the meaning of grace that works for me.

I've lived long enough to see significant strides in equality and justice, not that we're there yet, but we've made notable gains. Brown v. Board of Education declared separate but equal schools were *not* equal. The Equal Rights Amendment was passed. Lyndon B. Johnson signed Medicare into existence. And marriage equality became a reality, though a still-contentious one. I've seen great advances in health care, environmental awareness, communication and information technology.

I've been fortunate enough to pursue two quite meaningful and satisfying vocations, teaching at a university and publishing, and later an extremely rewarding career in ministry that continues to deeply satisfy me. It allows me to be a listening, supportive presence in people's lives when they most need it. It even gives me the opportunity to share these columns with people I care about!

I have had and have a wonderful group of friends and colleagues, and colleagues who I've been fortunate to know as friends. And family... a strangely and wonderfullyblended group of folks who personify the true meaning of family. I count my daughter's father and his wife among my extended family. I've been married to a man who was my soul mate, and then to another with whom I've been able to make a wonderful new life after the death of each of our spouses. Children biological and by marriage, siblings-bymarriage who have welcomed this only child into their midst. Grandchildren ranging in age from college age to under two years. I've been able to see people I love come through tough times and blossom. I haven't always been stellar at my various roles, but I've been a "good enough" wife, mom, stepmom, and grandmother. And I've been blessed to realize that, finally, although it took me awhile!

Then there are the places I've visited—the mountains I've climbed, the seas I've seen, the trails I've walked and hope yet to walk. The waterfalls that always lift my spirits as the water cascades down. The sunsets and sunrises I've seen, and the storms rolling in, the wind in the trees and the haunting calls of owls. And the music I've heard—choruses and symphonies, bagpipers, dulcimers and fiddle music.

Yes, there have been "hard graces" as well; we all have

them. Some ordinary, some are not so much so. Most of you are aware I grew up in a home sullied by emotional, physical, and sexual abuse. I've lived through a divorce and grieved the loss of a husband far too soon to cancer. I've grieved the deaths of family and close friends. A back injury put me on the "disabled" list for nearly a year and made me realize the truth of a colleague's saying that we're *all* "TBAs"—temporarily able-bodied. I'd have to agree with Bill Sinkford that this aging thing is a matter of "yes, but." I know as well that simply *being* 70 is a gift; many are not so fortunate.

This rather long reflection does have a point, or several points. Perhaps they will be of some help to you, too.

- For me, grace has a lot more to do with the graces of life in this world than it does with a divine being who provides for an eternal future. It's grace I can know, feel, touch, taste, smell, now.
- Grace is a matter of the daily graces of life, large and small and middle-sized, the things that we may not always recognize as ways in which we are blessed with grace. It's mystery sparkling through into the day-to-day.
- It's important to keep my spirit, heart and mind focused on the grace, not the inevitable grief of life.
- Grace is as much a matter of how we regard those things that come to us as it is those things in themselves.
- Living my life has enabled me to come to a point of not fearing death, because I believe that in death, we are embraced by that same endless grace that holds us throughout life. We're held in a web of being that we can't fall out of or be ejected from.
- We're called to be channels, agents, of that grace for one another.
- I love life dearly, and can turn sad at the thought of its ending (which I don't expect to happen any time soon!), but I can face into the wind of whatever comes after 70 with peace and calm.


