Small Group Ministry

This month I want to talk about Small Group Ministry: its meaning and origins, its practices and goals; and two Small Group Ministry offerings here at UUCM in the coming church year.

General Description

The purpose of Small Group Ministry (SGM) appears in its name: this is a method of "ministry" in small groups of people, generally from six to ten. SGM is practiced in many denominations. For example, many of my minister colleagues in the interfaith Interim Ministry Network serve churches with SGM programs. The practice has been around for several decades. One reason for creating this practice was for congregants in mega-churches to have a means of getting to know and trust a few people intimately, outside of the herd-effect of Sunday morning worship. Smaller congregations also benefit from building a few personal relationships at a time.

Many Unitarian Universalist congregations have SGM programs. UUs did not invent the practice, but in fact some of the first "hits" from googling the term lead to UU websites. For example, the UU Small Group Ministry

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The Magic of Imagination

January seems an especially appropriate time to reflect on imagination. This is perhaps even more true of *this* January. Many of us experience the start of the New Year as a time of new beginning, of starting fresh. Sometimes it's close to home and personal—start that exercise program, start looking for a job that better suits us, seek help for an addiction or dependency, ask that special someone to share the rest of their lives with us. These are not at all small things. They are transformative, life changing.

I've always been intrigued by photographs and paintings that depict a path that disappears into something I cannot see. When I'm out walking, I'll

usually stop to take a photo in those places where the path ahead of me does a disappearing act. The sense of openness, of possibility, and especially of mystery always catches my attention. I have far too many photographs of paths!

But this New Year feels somehow "bigger," more momentous. As if it were painted against the backdrop of a larger canvas. And indeed, there is a lot at stake.

Many of us, I expect, have shared the emotion of an emergency room physician who, after receiving the COVID vaccine, said, "I didn't just get a vaccination; I got a shot of hope." Even if we ourselves haven't yet been able to receive the vaccine, the hope, the imagination, is there. Several people recounted to

January 10 - "What If Roe Were Overturned?" Rev. Coeyman

On January 22, 1973 the US Supreme Court declared that women have a fundamental right to choose whether or not to continue a pregnancy. Alan, in the past several years there has been consistent chipping away at reproductive rights. Our UU values call us to take a stand to keep reproductive justice in the hands and hearts of women, not lawmakers. Let's imagine how women's lives would be significantly altered were Roe to be overturned, or were we to lose other social justice advocacy which is core to Unitarian Universalist identity. I will include memories of my tenure as chaplain of Planned Parenthood of Austin several years ago.

January 17 - "Recognizing All That Martin Was" Rev. Coeyman

On this weekend when we honor Martin Luther King for all he did to advance racial justice, let us also consider that there are many facets, many stories which make up the total of King's legacy. We have a tendency – rightly so – to create "heroes" or "saints" of those who have made monumental contributions to our lives. But is a "heroic" or "saintly" image the total of any given human being? Is any human being one dimensional? How do we reconcile diverse features to assess a complete image of another person? How do we recognize integrity?

January 24 - "Imagination, Transcendence, and Meaning" Bob Clegg

When UUs say to each other, "Keep the faith," what do we really mean? Is there a role for "faith" in Unitarian Universalism? Is there some definition of faith that Unitarian Universalists might agree on? Is imagination useful, or even required, to have faith? If so, does that imagination invalidate the reality or usefulness of such faith? In this deep midwinter, let us pause to consider the value of the practice of faith in our lives.

Bob Clegg is a Unitarian Universalist layperson and aspiring minister who serves as executive director of Justice Jobs, a free employment office in Frederick, MD. Bob is a former scientist who holds a Ph.D. in Chemistry. Several years ago, he earned an M.Div. from Wesley Theological Seminary, where Rev. Barbara Coeyman was his professor for UU History. Bob and his wife Connie live in New Market, MD, with their cat, Lilly, who makes all the important decisions.

January 31 - "The Heart's Song" Rev. Julia Corbett-Hemeyer

We've all probably had the experience: Our minds come up with a perfectly rational, reasonable idea, all the details laid out in good order...but our hearts just can't get into it. It's flat, dull, gray. But when our imagination takes hold, our hearts are right there, singing. What is it about imagination that has this magical effect? We'll close out our January theme by exploring some of the twists and turns of imagination.

January Dedicated Offering: Keeping the Dream Alive

In honor of Martin Luther King Day, our January dedicated offering goes to the MLK Dream Team.

Founded in 2003, the purpose of the MLK Dream Team is to stimulate, promote and foster harmonious relationships among all people; to provide a venue for candid dialogue; to develop and sponsor community activities and educational programs for youth and adults; to promote and facilitate services for those in need through a network of organizations; to dispel racial stereotypes and intolerance; and to be an activist for non-violent social change.

Among the activities of the Dream Team are hosting the National Day of Prayer, the Black History Month Kickoff Event every February, sponsorship of the Freedom Bus (a mobile exhibit on local civil rights history), supporting local voter registration drives, sponsorship of the Walk of Fame in Heekin Park (highlighting people and organizations in Delaware County by breaking down racial barriers), and scholarships and awards for outstanding young people.

You can get involved by attending the MLK Dream Team's monthly meetings. These are held from 8 – 9 am on the 4th Thursday of each month (no meeting in July or in December) via Zoom. We welcome community members who share our passion for spreading Dr. King's message and who want to help us promote and safeguard civil rights. In the Interim: Notes from the Transition Team

As our Interim Minister, **Rev. Barbara** is here to guide us in addressing the five focus points of interim ministry: claiming and honoring our past; recognizing our unique identity; clarifying the leadership roles of ministers, staff, and lay leaders; using the resources of our UU region and the UUA; and "coming to possess a renewed vision and strong stewardship, prepared for new growth and new professional leadership, ready to embrace the future." In short, Rev. Barbara will help prepare us for self-reflection and self-governance moving forward.

One of the ways in which UUCM is working through the tasks of an interim congregation is by the appointment of a Transition Team. In an essay, Rev. Judith Walker Riggs describes congregations in transition as journeying for a time in "a different country. The Transition Team, she writes, can serve as "travel guides for the expedition." To that end, the Transition Team will give the Interim Minister insight into "the congregation's culture and circumstances," working with the Interim on engaging the congregation in interim tasks, and serving as "both a planning group and a progress monitor" (Walker Riggs). Since much of our congregation is familiar with the collegiate environment, one might compare us to academic advisors. We seek to help members define, understand, and navigate the infrastructure of the church. This will work to ensure members find and prepare for roles they wish to fill in our shared future.

At this time, the Team is working with Rev. Barbara and the Board on assisting the congregation in developing a congregational covenant, or social contract. This shared understanding and trust in how we will interact, will be rooted in our shared values. This is the foundation to the completion of our transitional goals and our continued journey together (see Rev. Barbara's article in the December Unigram and her December 6 sermon for more on the congregational covenant).

UUCM's transition team consists of Jerry McKean (Chairperson), Ben Ewing, Katie Frederick, Eleanor Trawick, and Cindy Turner. Please contact any of us with questions, suggestions, and concerns.

If You Want a Pastoral Conversation...

Everyone in our congregation—not just Rev. Barbara and me—is part of the ministry of this church. We are all privileged to serve the whole in whatever ways we can. We're called to use our gifts and talents for the good of the whole. That's what we mean when we talk about "shared ministry."

One of the special gifts Rev. Barbara brings to us is her understanding of church systems, how they work and how they don't work, and her passion for helping them work better. In order to allow her to concentrate on that, we've designated me to be the lead person for pastoral care. As Rev. Barbara pointed out as well, I know people in our congregation better than she does. I work with Rev. Barbara and our capable and well-trained team of lay Pastoral Associates to meet the congregation's pastoral care needs.

Sharing both the joys and the concerns of the congregation is one of the privileges of doing pastoral care. If you seek pastoral or spiritual care around an issue in your life, or if you simply need a safe, listening ear or want to share a joy, call Rev. Julia (phone listed in UUCM directory). I can talk with you, or I may suggest one of our Pastoral Associates whose life experience indicates that they would be able to be of assistance. With all of us working from home now, I'm generally available to take calls, and I do check my voice mail. You may also email me at Julia@uuchurchmuncie.org. I prefer not to take calls after 5:00 in the afternoon or on Sundays. Of course, in the event of an emergency or crisis, I'm available at any time.

Small Group Ministry

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Network, a membership group open to all, provides resources, conversation, and connections with other SGM participants. My first training in SGM was in the late 1990s, when the practice also came to be identified as "covenant groups."

The website of the UU Small Group Ministry Network defines SGM like this: "Small group ministry is intentional small groups that deepen and expand the ministry of a congregation. Two key focuses are intimacy, or building community and deepening relationships, and ultimacy, or the opportunity for deeper spiritual exploration and search for meaning. Small group ministry is also called covenant group ministry, because the members in a group make an intentional commitment to one another.... At the heart of healthy congregations and life/world changing ministries we find 1) strong relationships, 2) engagement with meaningful issues, 3) leadership/leadership development, and 4) inspired action. Small group ministry contains all four of these elements."

Most Small Groups are organized around a theme or focus. Some are intentional theme programs such as the two we will offer at UUCM, described below. Some Small Groups are organized by what I'll call "identity" in congregational life, such as new members, parents of young children, congregants with interest in a particular artform, etc. One core feature is the quality of "ministry:" that is, the building of connections which demonstrate care for individuals and the welfare of the whole. Groups which meet regularly without a particular deepening agenda generally are not considered as SGM. To that, a commitment to a group covenant as well as regular attendance are central to strengthening group intimacy. Programs are intentionally managed by identified professional or lay leadership, who oversee enrollment, scheduling, and more. Participants know the tenure of the program they are signing up for: many UU programs run for a year, at the end of which period

groups are re-assembled so that participants have a chance to build deep relationships with other members of a congregation. In principle, no one is turned away from participating in a group: there is no "bar" that must be met. Generally, groups meet monthly for an hour or two. And yes, this ministry is transferable to online.

Small Group Ministry at UUCM

Here at UUCM we will offer two different programs of SGM through summer 2021. You have heard about these before. Some of you already participate in one or both, but let's continue to explain the contents and goals of each. I hope every reader of this Unigram will consider getting involved at some point. Big picture: "Circles of Trust" will be offered in a foursession series, January through April. New enrollment for "Soul Matters" group will be activated in May or June, so to be up and running through the summer. Both programs will be online via Zoom. Please contact christie@uuchurchmuncie.org if you would like mentoring on use of Zoom for this group activity.

"Circles of Trust" is a spiritual deepening program based on the writing of Parker Palmer and developed by the Center for Courage and Renewal (www.couragerenewal.org). By definition this is not a religious program but draws on practices from Quaker meeting. The premise of Parker Palmer's work is that, while an "authentic self" was born in each of us, as we go through life, we may lose a sense of who we are. We live "divided lives," pulled in many directions from that core we strive to be. The "Circles of Trust" practice restores wholeness. Directed first at individual, personal wholeness, as we practice open, honest, compassionate communications, we strengthen community through more authentic relationships with others in the community. As a credentialed Facilitator in this program, I have been offering "Circles of Trust" in my interim ministries for several years. Especially during congregational change, this program restores trust if trust has been broken, and strengthens trust which is already present. After twenty years of existence, there are "Circles of Trust" Facilitators around the world, and the practice is used in many disciplines and

professions, including religious life, medicine, and teaching.

A "Circle of Trust" gathering can be anywhere from an hour to several days in duration. Here at UUCM I will offer two-hour sessions, once a month, with a choice of two different days of the week and times of the day. See below for specific dates and times. I would hope for a commitment to regular attendance, but every session will be open to newcomers to the practice.

Sitting in a circle embodies the equality among participants, including the Facilitator. A circle is grounded in what are called "Touchstones:" agreements for how we will be together. An important Touchstone is confidentiality. During a "Circle of Trust," we come together in different combinations: as a whole group, in individual reflection, and in in-depth conversations with two or three others. Our reflections and conversations are stimulated by what are called "Third Things," readings and other objects such as art or nature which inspire conversation within the group. I will offer a particular curriculum written by CCR Facilitators called *Geography of Grace*, which calls on locations in the natural world - mountains, sea, night sky – as inspiration for spiritual deepening.

"Soul Matters" is a Small Group Ministry program created and staffed by the Unitarian Universalist Association. It resembles "Circles of Trust" in some of its practices, but its organization, leadership, and content are different. "Soul Matters" is the UUA rendering of "theme-based ministry:" that is, a method of organizing congregational life around a different theme each month, on which many of the programs of the congregation are based. This method renders an integral quality to congregational life. Here at UUCM there are currently three Soul Matters groups, and we support the monthly theme in worship and religious education. Additionally, because several hundred UU congregations use "Soul Matters," connections across congregations are strengthened. Participants in the meetings

receive a monthly packet, chock full of readings, quotes, questions for conversation, and more. Each meeting begins with confidential check-in.

Facilitation of groups is usually led by lay members of the congregation, while a staff member or lay leader serves as overall coordinator of the program. The national Soul Matters program also offer monthly mentoring so leaders can share additional resources with each other and talk about engaging the themes in various ministries. I will oversee the program and UUCM member Nicole Kaplan will serve as coordinator of Facilitators and group membership. See below for more from Nicole on upcoming training for Facilitators.

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The Magic of Imagination

me weeping with joy as they watched the first trucks roll away from the Pfizer plant, or the early vaccinations of front-line health care workers. The vaccine has enabled people to imagine a life beyond COVID, not going back to what life pre-pandemic was, but something that is sustainable beyond lockdowns and foregone holiday celebrations. At the same time, the changes we've experienced have invited us to imagine an even better life. I recall news stories from New York City during the lockdown, people looking out at their usually carclogged streets and thinking about how they could be made more pedestrian friendly. New Yorkers have begun to put that into action in some places.

Arundhati Roy writes in The Pandemic is a Portal: "Our minds are still racing back and forth, longing for a return to "normality," trying to stitch our future to our past and refusing to acknowledge the rupture. But the rupture exists... Nothing could be worse than a return to normality. Historically, pandemics have forced humans to break with the past and imagine their world anew. This one is no different. It is a portal, a gateway between one world and the next." Perhaps this will be a part of the legacy of the pandemic, along with all the pain and anguish it has brought.

President-elect Joseph Biden's recent speech encouraged a new vision that enables us to imagine a national life beyond the Trump vision of despotism, a vision of democracy restored, a restoration of the very "soul of America." He calls us to imagine a life beyond the racial, ideological, economic, political, ethnic and gender chasms that divide us. We are nowhere near there yet, and there will be a lot of hard work and conflict before we get there. But something in our national imagination has been ignited.

Rev. Barbara will continue introducing us to Circles of Trust this month. Circles of Trust will allow us an imaginative, participative glimpse into how we can be together as a congregation, and as a congregation with our new settled minister when that time comes. It also gives us a way of imagining a new way of being as individuals within the community of individuals.

Our rational minds can scheme and plan, consider alternatives, weigh various courses of action. But it's imagination that makes our hearts sing, that draws us inexplicably toward one or another alternative. We can create a quite reasonable plan in our mind, all the details neatly laid out, but our hearts just can't get on board. Then when something fires up our imagination, our hearts are right there.

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
