## **UUCM Ministry Going Forward**

#### Rev. Dr. Barbara Coeyman, Interim Minister

In her report during the Congregational Meeting on May 23, Board President Emily Wornell reminded this congregation that UUCM's "Ministry Going Forward" will be an important topic of conversation in the coming months. Near the end of this first year of interim ministry, some areas of this conversation are known, while others remain open for indepth exploration, education, and discussion in the coming months.

Before I offer more details about options for ministry, let's review a few important concepts. First, the relationship between a settled minister and a congregation is a "called" ministry, voted on by the entire congregation. A primary goal of transitioning ministry is to prepare congregations for an effective and productive "call" to follow. In contrast, transitioning ministries are "hired" by the governing Board, not the entire congregation. "Hired" ministries are usually time-limited, while "called" ministry is open-ended, as long as the relationship is productive. Transitioning ministry is not lesser service than called ministry, just different in timeframe and goals. UU transitioning ministry has changed significantly over the past several years. With strong support from the national Transitions Office during the transitioning time, congregations (continued on page 7)

are much better prepared to find compatible matches in their called ministers. One reason for this increased effectiveness is that the timeframe of search has expanded significantly since UUCM last participated: the current recommendation is to allow eighteen to twenty months for the entire search process.

In her report Emily confirmed what we "know" about ministry going forward: UUCM will not settle a minister by August 2022, after two years of interim ministry. While two-year interims are the norm, several factors this year have extended UUCM's timeframe. The greatest factor has been the pandemic. UUCM is not alone: several other congregations which began interim ministry in August 2020 will not be settling a new minister in two years. Additionally, that UUCM was emerging from challenging relationships when this interim period began also extended the timeline. For UUCM to settle a new minister in August 2022, the search process would have had to begin by December 2020.

Following Emily's explanation of what is "known" about UUCM Ministry Going Forward, during the congregational meeting I briefly outlined the two principal options for next steps in ministry. I want to review these here, in part to provide more details than I had time for during the congregational meeting. For readers seeking extended descriptions of these options, see resources listed in this article. I encourage everyone to review as much of these materials as possible to prepare for a Town Hall on Sunday June 13 after the worship service. This is an important meeting, not only to learn more about ministry, but especially because you will have the chance to talk directly with two staff from the national UUA Transitions Office: Rev. Keith Kron, **Transitions Director** 

(<u>https://www.uua.org/offices/people/keith-kron</u>); and Christine Purcell, Transitions Program Manager (<u>https://www.uua.org/offices/people/christinepurcell</u>). Keith and Christine know the search process very well and are immensely supportive of congregations and minister. There are two primary options for ministry going forward after the second year of interim (2021-2022). **Option One**: UUCM could continue interim ministry for a third year (2022-2023), to settle a called minister in August 2023. As noted, three-yearinterims are not uncommon. I served one, the decision in that congregation to extend based on needing more time to prepare for an effective search. The recommended overall timeline for this option of third-year interim looks generally like this:

- October December 2021: Groundwork to form a Search Committee, to include allcongregation polling
- January February 2022: Election of Search Committee
- Spring Summer 2022: Begin work with UUA Settlement Coach
- Fall 2022: internal work, surveys, etc. to discern UUCM identity and goals for next called minister; congregational workshops such as Beyond Categorical Thinking
- November 2022: UUCM online "packet" is due
- January 2023: search committee reviews applications, begins interviews
- February 2023: Pre-Candidating ("short list" of three for weekend-long interviews)
- Late April / early May 2023: Candidating Week (weeklong visit of final candidate to congregation), Call to Ministry
- Summer 2023: preparation for new ministry

Following the second or third year of interim ministry, **Option Two** for UUCM is Developmental Ministry. Developmental is a relatively new type of UU transitioning ministry, intended for congregations which want to delve more deeply into the work of transitioning beyond the usual two- or three-year-interim timeframe, so to identify deep (continued on page 8)

issues which cause recurring symptoms in congregational life, such as conflict, lack of trust, burnout, lack of generosity, low volunteer satisfaction, or ministerial turnover. One major difference between interim and developmental ministry is that in the latter, the congregation defines goals particular to the congregation which are most necessary for successful settlement following the developmental period. Developmental goals contrast the more "generic" Five Focus Points of interim ministry. Developmental ministry may last between three and seven years: a minimum of five is recommended to effect lasting cultural change. During the final 18 – 20 months of the Developmental period the search process as explained above is used to call the next minister. As a transitioning minister, a developmental minister is hired by the Board, not called by the congregation, and is not eligible for the call after the developmental period. In any given year there are approximately ten to twenty UU congregations engaged in developmental ministry. It has been proven highly successful in defining congregational identity and positive relationships with ministers.

## June Dedicated Offering Home Savers of Delaware County

Imagine you are an aging homeowner with an income of \$773 per month and you suddenly have a health condition that confines you to a wheelchair. Leaving your home for medical appointments or anything becomes almost impossible. What do you do? Call Home Savers of Delaware County (HSDC)!

Home Savers completes about 50 urgent home repairs and accessibility modifications for low-income homeowners per year, hiring licensed contractors as needed, and working with volunteers to complete *all* administrative tasks and carpentry projects. UUCM has a long history of participation in assisting with these.

Following a year of COVID-19 restrictions, we are once again inviting volunteers to help us tackle the long waiting list for ramps and porches/steps. We hope you will join us; no prior experience required.

More than 85% of our homeowners are elderly and/or disabled, and almost half are extremely low-income, with an annual income of less than \$17,420 for a 2-person household, for example.

HSDC is the only organization providing free emergency repairs and wheelchair ramps for low income homeowners. We believe that all homes should be safe, warm and dry--accessible to their residents and equipped with dependable heating, plumbing and water-tight roof. Our work allows people to remain in their homes as they age.

While we have grants from Community Foundation, First Presbyterian Church and United Way, and funds from loyal donors, the cost of lumber has risen 300% since last year. Your support is critical to our success.

#### Whistling

Whistling is an act That commends itself to our attention, The lyric protest of the soul Against the dark, That demands the night be gone A little sooner, Or invites the day to stay A little longer.

As I thought about our theme for this month and whether or not I do in fact play, I discovered that for me it's at least in part a matter of semantics. I tend to use different vocabulary when I think of what others might describe as play.

One of my go-to words is *recreation*. For example: When I go out to walk with a focus on either increasing my distance and endurance or my speed, that's *exercise*. However, when Tom and I go to Morrow's Meadow or some other natural place to walk, that's *recreation*, in my mind, although it's clearly exercise as well. My focus and my mindset are quite different. During those walks, I often stop and watch the river or take pictures or watch a subtle motion in a tree until I find the bird who caused it.

Driving in which the primary objective is to get something done (to pick up groceries, let's say) is not at all play-like. A road trip, however, even though it typically ends up going someplace, is recreation. Bicycling is always recreation, even in the rare instances when I'm biking in order to get someplace.

Walking the dog is recreation and leisure, even though it's necessary that she be walked. Brushing her teeth, also necessary, is anything but recreation!

Another word that I use when describing play-like activity is *relaxation*. If I'm reading something for professional reasons, that's, well, professional or work, even though it may be, and often is, quite enjoyable. But when I've lost myself in a memoir or a good novel, that's relaxation. Thinking about the word relaxation brings to mind things I do that have a play-like dimension for me that many people, I expect, would not find play-like at all. Folding laundry can be that way for me, particularly if it's a load of fluffy towels warm from the dryer. So can ironing. Cleaning and reorganizing closets and drawers can be play, although day-in day-out cleaning and dusting is definitely not.

Some activities seem to me to exist in some kind of in-between state. Writing is one of these. If it isn't going well, when every paragraph feels like a slog through a mosquito-infested swamp, that's *work*. On the other hand, if it is going well and whatever I'm writing is just *there*, waiting for me to put fingers to keyboard, I've described it as the most fun I can have with my mind, no matter what I'm writing. Then it mysteriously becomes play.

Sometimes, it has to do with whether or not I feel I have enough time to do the activity in question, and if I have the energy for it. Cooking is a good example. If I have the time and energy, cooking, especially creating a new dish that promises to reward our taste buds or experimenting with a recipe to put my own stamp on it, approaches what I think many people mean when they use the word *play*. If I don't have the time and/or the energy, I do not enjoy cooking. Almond butter sandwich, here I come!

These ramblings about what is and isn't play for me lead me to the thought that, for me anyway, play and its analogs are not clearly distinguishable from not-play. Some of the distinction attaches to what the activity is. Another part of it has to do with my mindset. To some extent, it depends on if it is primarily goal-oriented or not. Sometimes, it is sheer serendipity.

In the end, I would answer my own question, yes, I do play. I just use different words to talk about it.
