Dismantling White Supremacy

Rev. Dr. Barbara Coeyman, Interim Minister

As UUCM moves forward in transitioning ministry, there are three important projects to focus on this year. You have already begun deep conversations about one, "Ministry Going Forward." Another project which will begin in a few weeks is the "History Timeline." Often one of the first activities of an interim period, during pandemic, here at UUCM and in many other interim congregations, we have delayed this project which, in many settings, is better presented in an actual display rather than in digital format. An offshoot of a history Timeline is for UUCM to explore writing and publishing its congregational history.

A third important project is to focus on is the advancement of Anti-Racism, Anti-Oppression, and Multi-Culturalism (ARAOMC), through conversations, study groups, and outreach. This is perhaps the single most critical topic in the Unitarian Universalist Association right now, brought home all the more in 2020 in the aftermath of the murder of George Floyd in Minneapolis. Floyd's murder occurred just before the publication of a report entitled "Widening the Circle of Concern" from the Commission on Institutional Change (COIC): (https://www.uuabookstore.org/Widening-the-Circle-of-Concern-P18686.aspx.) May we honor every moment as a chance to begin anew.

May we root our faith in richer soil than worry.

May we let separation knit us close.

May we see faces besides our own in the mirror.

It's one thing to compose covenants, as UUCM engaged in very fruitful "covenanting" last spring leading to the current All-Church Covenant. However covenants are only as strong as our accountability for maintaining them. How can this congregation live into accountability for its new covenant and so for stronger relationships here at UUCM?

October 17 - "Birdwatching as a Spiritual Practice" Cassandra Montenegro

What is it about picking up a pair of binoculars, lifting your eyes up to a far-off fluttering, or attuning your ears to a familiar chirp, that transports so many of us to spaces of peace? Whether you're in the woods with friend, on the seashore with family, or looking out the window of your apartment, take a joyful journey into how birding and birdwatching can restore connection and confidence in our communities and ourselves.

October 24 – "Cultivating Relationships through Wisdom from the Trees" Rev. Coeymar

Many of us may have deep visual appreciation for trees, of all shapes and sizes and smells. We may even have spiritual experiences from our connections with trees. New investigations about how trees communicate with one another, such as by Suzanne Simard in Finding the Mother Tree, goes beyond aesthetic benefits to what trees can teach us about interpersonal relationships. Consider what you can learn about cultivating relationships from your favorite tree!

October 31 – "Remembering All Souls" Rev. Coeyman

This time of the year is marked by several holidays acknowledging the passage of time. Day of the Dead is a Mexican holiday honoring departed loved ones. All Saints Day honors church leaders and All Souls Day focuses on "regular" folks. Halloween brings out the child in each of us. In this service, let us come together to recall and celebrate relationships, to include a photo ceremony of remembrance of departed "Souls" of congregants. Don't forget the traditional UUCM Halloween Parade at the end of the service.

We don't yet know a date for returning to in person services in our wonderful sanctuary, but we know that moment is inching closer and closer. I continue to be most thankful for **Susan Bossung** and our COVID taskforce continuing to guide and support the board. I think we had all really expected over the summer than we would make a return to in-person services in September or October, but the Delta variant ruined those plans. I share your disappointment in continuing to wait, just as I share your concern over the vast number of cases in our community and in area hospitals.

The good news is that we continue to take action toward reuniting. **Rev. Barbara** is now bringing together our volunteers and staff for a Worship Taskforce, which will coordinate worship associates, technology, music, childcare, and responsibilities like greeters and ushers to prepare ourselves for this new normal when the time is right. The board has approved purchases of air purifiers (more on this at a future time) that will live throughout the building in order to properly circulate and clean the air. We move closer and closer to this moment, but there is a very important role we are not prepared to fill, and that is the welcoming of new folks to our community.

This is where YOU (yes, you) come in.

I think serving on a membership committee is one of the more difficult ways to volunteer within a congregation. In discussions with Rev. Barbara, she highlighted for me the three purposes for membership committees. One is to welcome visitors, educate as necessary, and journey with them through the process of joining the congregation. Two is to deepen new member relationships in their first few years so that new members turn in to long-time members. And third, to reconnect and call back to engagement long time members who may have, over time, been less visible members of our community.

And here's the greatest secret Barbara told me: No membership committee is ever going to fully engage with all three.

I served on our membership committee in my second year here in the congregation, and I'm well reminded of the frustrating work, trying to do so much but seeming to do so little. I know many in our community have similar disappointing experiences serving in that role. But here we are approaching a nexus moment, where returning to in person services with reengage long-time members, deepen newer member relationships, and welcome new faces into our building for the first time in 18 months.

We need now more than ever a group of people dedicated to welcoming and unifying our community. Will you be one of them?

October Dedicated Offering: Muncie Afghan Refugee Resettlement Committee (MARRC)

The recent departure of the American military from Afghanistan left thousands of Afghan supporters of the American efforts in danger. As a result, many were evacuated and are temporarily residing at military bases in the United States, including nearby Camp Atterbury. Thanks to the efforts of AWAKEN, which has assisted Afghan women and families for many years, Muncie has a history of supporting efforts to aid Afghans in need of help with health care, education, vocational training, and clean water and sanitation. This history places Muncie in position to sponsor Afghan families who are resettling in the United States.

Volunteers from several Muncie organizations, including UUCM, have come together to form the Muncie Afghan Refugee Resettlement Committee (MARRC). This Committee will help Afghani refugee families arriving at Camp Atterbury to settle in Muncie, Delaware County, and surrounding areas. Among its goals are identifying the number of refugee families to be sponsored, contacting government agencies to identify the refugees that might qualify for resettlement, raising funds to assist MARRC families, and arranging with local, state, and federal agencies to coordinate the transition of MAARC families into our community. This includes arranging for housing, education, transportation, jobs and basic necessities such as phones, appliances, and autos. The ultimate goal is to help families establish themselves to become independent, functional, and productive members of the Muncie Community.

Members of the committee have already been in contact with Camp Atterbury, the Department of Homeland Security, the Department of State, and the Governor's Office. Locally, the committee's efforts are supported by the City of Muncie, Ball State University, IU Health, AWAKEN and several other local churches and organizations.

This is a community-wide, intensive and extensive effort. UUCM is proud to play a part. Please be generous in your support.

Rev. Barbara Coeyman (continued from page 1) commitment to practicing and promoting anti-racism. Congregations are encouraged to study this report through the use of a study guide for adult education classes: https://www.uua.org/files/2020-10/widening study action.pdf. Stay tuned for communication as we at UUCM plan to offer the "Widening the Circle of Concern" curriculum and other conversations about Dismantling White Supremacy.

To lay groundwork for UUCM's attention to "ARAOMC" matters, for the rest of this column, please find a very helpful summary by way of thirteen characteristics of how "white supremacy" culture is manifested in organizations and congregations. This summary was first articulated twenty years ago and yet remains relevant today. I excerpt the following from *Dismantling Racism: A Workbook for Social Change Groups*, by Kenneth Jones and Tema Okun (ChangeWork, 2001). As you read this list of characteristics of white supremacy, I invite you to ask yourself, do any of these descriptions apply to your own way of being in the world?

- **1. Perfectionism:** little appreciation for the work that others are doing, more common is to identify what is wrong, and little ability to identify, name, and appreciate what is right; making a mistake is confused with being a mistake, doing wrong with being wrong
- 2. A Sense of Urgency: makes it difficult to be inclusive, think long-term, consider consequences; sacrificing potential allies for quick or highly visible results
- **3. Defensiveness:** the defensiveness of people in power creates an oppressive culture and makes it difficult to raise these ideas; energy is spent making sure that feelings aren't hurt or working around defensive people
- 4. **Quantity Over Quality:** things that can be measured are more highly valued than things that cannot be; discomfort with emotion and feelings; little awareness of importance of people's need to be heard
- **5. Worship of the Written Word**: if not in a memo, information doesn't exist; only one right way; celebrates people with writing skills; lower value for other ways to share information

- 6. **Paternalism**: decision-making is clear to those with power and unclear to those without it; those with power think they can make decisions in the interests of those without power; those without power understand they do not have it and understand who does
- **7. Either/Or Thinking**: linked to perfectionism, things are either/or, good/bad, right/wrong, with us/against us; no "both/and;" creates sense of urgency
- 8. **Power Hoarding:** power seen as limited, only so much to go around, little value around sharing power; those with power assume they know best interests of the organization and
- **9. Fear of Open Conflict:** emphasis on being polite; people in power scared of conflict and try to run from it, blame people for raising discomfort rather than looking at issue causing the problem
- **10. Individualism**: little experience or comfort working as part of a team, delegating to others; individual rather than group recognition and credit; isolation; competition over cooperation; lack of accountability
- **11**. **Progress is Bigger, More:** observed in ways we determine success; progress defined as ability to serve more people (regardless of quality);
- **12. Objectivity:** the belief that objectivity exists, that emotions are inherently destructive, irrational, and not important in decision-making; invalidating people who show emotion; ignoring or invalidating those who think other than in linear style
- **13. Right to Comfort**: those with power have a right to emotional and psychological comfort; scapegoating those who cause discomfort; equating individual acts of unfairness against white people with systemic racism which daily targets people of color

I invite you to keep this list handy this year as we offer conversations and other activities devoted to making our personal and congregational life more open, inviting, and respectful of all types of diversity.

May we dedicate our daily work both to those we love and to the common good.

May we sustain those workers whose invisible labor sustains us all.

May we protect those who put themselves at risk to protect us.

May we transform the impossible into the doable.

May we inquire into the welfare of strangers.

May we stand up for those who are scapegoated and targeted by hate.

May we sing porch to porch until all the world is our neighbor.

May we drop expectations of how hard or long this road will be.

May we pace ourselves as we go.

May we each shoulder more of the load so that nobody stumbles beneath it.

May we prepare ourselves for the unknown.

May we follow the light of our brightest prayers.

May we live together into better versions of ourselves.

May we plant the seeds of a new world in what remains of the old one.

May we remember in the dark hours that we're not alone.

May we let no one die forsaken, in pain, or untouched by kindness.

May we grieve the lost, though we cannot gather.

May we do right by their memory.

May we not waste a minute of the precious time they should have had.

May we love one another as we would be loved. May our children survive us all.
