What Does It Mean, to "Widen the Circle?"

I know you've heard the phrase "Widening the Circle" in many UU contexts recently. "Widening the Circle" was the theme for UUCM's 2022 annual stewardship drive. It is also the title of a current Adult Education class here at UUCM called "Widening the Circle of Concern," a course based on a 2020 UUA report of the same title written by the Commission On Institutional Change (COIC).

This image of widening a circle is an apt one for liberal religion. A circle is an egalitarian geometric shape: no one point on a circle is most important. We often sit in a circle for conversations for spiritual deepening, or for groups organized by leadership of the whole, or for dialogue to repair conflict or restore broken covenants. Complementing the egalitarian shape of a circle, the image of expanding any of our circles expresses one of the basic premises of religion in a liberal mode: the premise that revelation is not sealed, that in the liberal way there are few absolutes, that the door is always open for more exploration, more dialogue about how to negotiate this journey called life. 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Faith—It Isn't What You Might Think

As I began thinking about it, I was struck by the many times—both large and small—when our lives invite and often require us to have faith of one sort or another. Some of these are very small indeed, and far from great significance: how we routinely turn on a light switch without giving a thought to whether the light will come on. We have faith, that is, in the light performing as anticipated...until it doesn't. This "everyday faith" allows us to function with much less mental and emotional effort than would be the case otherwise.

In these everyday faith situations, sometimes having that faith violated proves to be really challenging to our faith, while other times it doesn't. Most of the time, if we flip the switch and discover that the light is burned

out, we just replace the bulb and think nothing of it. But suppose we replace the bulb and the doggoned thing still doesn't light. That may prove to be a bigger challenge. You get the idea.

Our everyday lives also call on us to have faith in ourselves and in others. Our individual and civic lives would be utterly derailed otherwise. From the smallest decisions to the hugely consequential marriage or partnership, coming out as someone who identifies as LGBTQI, deciding to resign from one job to take another, deciding to have or not to have a child. All of us can probably think of times in our own lives when this type of faith was challenged and undermined. In those situations, it's important that we find ways to regroup and shore up that basic faith.

This concept is a key spiritual call to deepen our relationships with the stranger within and the strangers we meet in life's journey as we endeavor to embody the work of the Widening the Circle of Concern report and truly embrace living into the Beloved Community Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. preached about.

Rev. Katie (pronouns she/ella) is a multiracial Latinx/Italian minister currently serving a DC Metro congregation. She is one of the co-authors of the Commission on Appraisal Report, *Class Action: The Struggle with Class in Unitarian Universalism*, and she serves as a member of the UUA Ministerial Fellowship Committee. She has joined us today after enjoying the sites in Indy and visiting her cousin, Valerie, who lives in the area.

March 13 – "The Language of Faith" Rev. Coeyman

Our worship theme in March is "faith." Today let's consider what we mean by "faith" and why one of the most popular introductory readings for new members of Unitarian Universalism is a book called *Our Chosen Faith*.. Let's also examine how we personally talk about faith, so to review a UUA project started several years ago known as "elevator speeches." A reminder that Daylight Saving Time begins today – spring forward!

March 20 - "What Do We Mean by 'Faith Development?'" Rev. Coeyman

What do we mean by "faith development?" How does this term compare with "religious education?" What is important about the current trend toward "lifespan faith development" in UU Congregations? How do adults continue to grow and develop in their relationship with faith? What goals do you have for you own personal faith development? We will also recognize the Spring Equinox in this service.

March 27 – "Faith without Certainty, Part Two" Rev. Coeyman

The condition of "doubt" in the sense of "uncertainty" or "open-endedness" is core to liberal religion. In contrast with fundamentalism, liberalism asserts that truth is not fixed and theology is informed by current, reasoned knowledge about the world. This fluid approach to theology and religion can often feel risky. What role does doubt play in your life as a Unitarian Universalist? Do you believe in the story of the "Velveteen Rabbit?"

early twentieth-century poet Edwin Markham, often cited as a core expression of Universalist theology:

He drew a circle that shut me out,

Heretic, rebel, a thing to flout.

But love and I had the wit to win:

We drew a circle and took him in.

Consider how this image of an ever-widening circle applies to your life: to your daily endeavors in home and family and school and work, as well as to your roles and responsibilities as a participant in this congregation which is grounded on the values, principles, and covenants of liberal faith.

Let me say more about both the publication and the class: "Widening the Circle of Concern." In my view, these new materials represent a significant turning point, a transformation in Unitarian Universalism's capacity to practice the equity and egality we profess in principle. In several recent sermons I have reviewed some of the big-picture challenges Unitarian Universalists have experienced since the midtwentieth century in creating authentic diversity, multi-culturalism, and restorative justice. Many attempts to widen the circle in race, class, and gender met with less than acceptable success. Then in 2017 Unitarian Universalism experienced a major rupture over lack of diversity in staffing at upper levels of the denomination. This controversy led to resignations of at least three white men in positions of authority, including the national president. An interim trio of three ministers of color filled the presidency until the first woman was elected in her own right in 2018. The interim trio recommended establishing the COIC to create both a process of truth and reconciliation and programs to identify and dismantle white supremacy culture. The volunteers serving on the COIC were a team of eight lay and ordained members. Their work led to the published report in 2020 and subsequent curriculum: a new way forward in defining new habits for centering the margins. Initiatives to increase diversity in hiring are working: for example, the current Leadership Council of the UUA is approximately forty percent people of color.

Here at UUCM, the adult education class "Widening the Circle" is in progress through May. The class meets on the fourth Wednesday of the month, 7:00 – 8:30 p.m., in partnership with the UU congregation of Fort Wayne. Even if you have not yet participated, it is not too late to register for the next session, on Wednesday March 23. This class can lay excellent theological and practical groundwork for what I've heard is a strong desire among you, to develop a more concerted program of social justice here at UUCM. Indeed, a robust social justice program is one of the Goals for the Developmental Ministry which begins in August 2022.

Faith—It Isn't What You Might Think

I think of faith primarily as *trust* or confidence. For me, it certainly is not believing something for which I have no evidence. It isn't a Pollyanna "everything's gonna be all right" faith. It really isn't a matter of belief at all. Rather, it's a basic attitude, a fundamental stance I take up toward life, one of *trust*, tempered (I hope) by a healthy dose of realism and caution.

Our faith in our UUCM community's leadership has been tested recently, and to a lesser extent, continues to be. We can also describe faith as having confidence in the honesty or integrity of a person or thing. This description is especially helpful in our current situation. I don't claim to have any sweeping, global solutions that will suddenly "fix" us. There isn't one, anyway. The fix is that we all work on it together, consistently, and with abundant good will. What I want to do is put the lack of faith in ministry and leadership that we've seen at UUCM in a broader context, and offer some suggestions.

Part of that larger context is that faith isn't a big "religious word," but something we do every day, usually without thinking about it, as I've described above. It's been co-opted by conservative religious interests to some extent, but it certainly has a life beyond "belief in the supernatural."

Another context is that many Americans have lost faith/trust in institutions in general. This has been documented in several carefully researched studies. Few if any institutions have escaped this more generalized fall off in confidence, including religious institutions and their leadership. The immediacy of communication made possible by the internet has been and continues to be a wonderful thing. However, it also contributes to there being a lot of unvetted information out there, partial information, misinformation, and disinformation. Today's information, even if accurate, may not be next week's. We need not look further than covid for plentiful examples.

What we've experienced at UUCM, while about individuals and groups, took place within this much larger setting of conflict around religious language and a generalized culture of mistrust. How can we go about restoring that trust, then? A few suggestions:

Let's listen to each other. It seems so simple, and yet it can be so difficult. When confronted with behaviors, opinions, or points of view we disagree with, don't immediately jump to "I don't agree with you & you're wrong." Stop and really *listen*. Why might the person hold this point of view? What might have motivated the behavior? We can also recognize and honor our *own* hurt if we've been hurt by someone, and take the step of letting the person know they have hurt us. Healing, if it is to happen, must happen from both sides.

As Rev. Kimberley noted in her sermon last month, can we acknowledge that ours is not the only truth. It is our truth, and it's important for our lives, but it isn't the only truth. Others hold truths that are equally significant for them. We can learn from others' truths, too, and they from ours.

It gets harder for most of us when the issue is behavior rather than ideas. I'm not at all suggesting that intolerable behaviors be met with acceptance of the behavior, or overlooked and allowed to continue. However, we can still meet the person engaging in the behavior with grace. That's a crucial difference. We can still ask what motivated the behavior. We can still seek a solution together. We can still listen to one another. We can assume good intentions while acknowledging unskillfulness and clumsiness in carrying out those intentions. Have any of us not found ourselves in that situation? I certainly have!

We can also realize that none of us is one-dimensional. We're each a mix of attitudes and behaviors, of emotional intelligence and times when we just don't get it. We all make mistakes, and we each have our moments we can be proud of.

We can also remember that those who have stepped forward to lead us not are not the same people as those in our history. They aren't perfect either, but they *are* different. It's sometimes easy to let feelings about previous people spill over onto the next person who fills that role. If we feel ourselves reacting, we can stop and ask, "who am I reacting to?"

As a church community, we share something Very precious—love for our church family and the desire to see both the congregation and the individuals in it flourish. May we let that be our pole star as we go forward, honoring the past, embracing the present, and trusting in the future.
