## What’s New in Volunteering at UUCM?

The Soul Matters theme for April is “Awakening.” Indeed, Spring is a time for awakening – to more hours of sunlight, warmer temperatures, and budding flowers and trees. This year Springtime awakening feels especially life-giving as we also emerge from two years of intractable restrictions from the covid pandemic. Now, in this season of awakening, we can resume favorite activities. Even more important, awakening invites us to envision new, creative ways of moving forward, in personal matters, in our work, and in congregational life here at UUCM.

In my role as transitioning minister, I want to keep you updated on several forward-looking changes in leadership at UUCM. For one, this year I have recommended formation of a **Leadership Council** and associated **Leadership Development** process, a current best practice in many congregations. Some of you probably recall that UUCM had a Program Council, made up by the chairs of various committees. A Leadership Council consists of those same committee chairs, but with a focus on honing skills in lay leadership, essential for our congregations organized by

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## Snapshots of Awakening

Our theme for April is *awakening*. And what a marvelous month to engage more deeply with awakening—the *experience* of awakening rather than the idea of it. The natural world is awakening more and more each day, burgeoning forth from the long rest of winter. The leaf buds on the tree outside my home office window are swelling so fast that I see the changes easily on a daily basis. My mornings are blessed anew by a richness of birdsong, and there are birds building nests in our trees again. So come along with me if you will as we look at four verbal snapshots of awakening.

(1) Our Soul Matters packets for this month offer many ways into awakening. I’ll share just two of them.

Alastair Humphreys is an adventurer who has had many grand, epic-scale adventures (think round-the-world cycling). But he’s also an adventurer of the small. Soul Matters recounts this: Humphreys “ordered a 12-mile square map of the area where he lives, and he spent a year exploring each half-mile square on that map. The result? The world around him came alive again. He tells the story of this local adventure [here](#). You can find a video of his explorations [here](#). And read his reflections of what he discovered [here](#). It all boiled down to this: the familiar world around him came alive again!” We can do this in our own back yard or whatever small piece of the Earth is closest to us. **April 3 – “At This Time of Awakening”    Rev. Coeyman**

The Youth of UUCM will invited everyone to Awaken to the Unitarian Universalist 8th Principle. Youth have worked through an anti-racism curriculum and will be sharing their journey with the congregation through storytelling, music, and art.

**April 17 – “Easter Sunday: Many Awakenings, Many Blossoms”    Rev. Coeyman, UUCM Staff**

On this Easter Sunday morning we celebrate the re-awakening of Mother Earth from winter cold and darkness. In our multi-generational service, we share story-telling and music-making for all ages. We will also hold the traditional UU Flower Ceremony in celebration of springtime beauty, diversity, and community, created by Unitarian Nortbert Capek in Prague in 1923. Bring flowers to give to the ceremony, and take away a blossom gifted by another person.

We will be holding the 2&3 year old class, but we will NOT be holding the 4yr/K-5 grade class. Following the service there will be an Easter Egg Hunt on the church grounds.

**April 24 – “Vitamin N: A Multi-Generational Prescription for Saving This Planet”    Rev. Coeyman**

As we celebrate both Earth Day and the retirement of long-time UUCM Director of Religious Education Nadine Tringali, let’s reflect on a children’s learning program that is good for all of us. Environmentalist Richard Louv calls us to consider the importance of children’s strong and regular connections with Nature. Spending time in nature is good for everyone’s health. Louv’s landmark book, *Last Child in the Woods*, emphasizes the importance of a healthy dose of “Vitamin-N” in the daily lives of children. Louv offers tips for all of us to increase time in the natural world.

### Sunday Mornings at UUCM

As of Sunday, March 20, we resumed having all children and youth begin in the sanctuary with their parents. Our class for 2 & 3 year old children is in the Blue Room and is available at 10:30. Our 4 year/K-5th grade class is held in the fellowship hall and begins following the Story for All Ages and Lantern Lighting. The congregation sings them out to their classes. Youth in 6th through 12th grades are invited to attend the service on Sunday mornings. Their Curriculum Sundays are included in their Youth Group meetings which are held on Sunday afternoons. Infants and toddlers up to 23 months will remain with their parents, as we are not offering Nursery care at this time. The Nursery Room will be available.

On Easter Sunday, April 17, we will be holding an **Easter Egg Hunt** after the service on the church grounds for our youngest children through 5th grade. Each child should look for seven eggs to represent our seven principles. Our youngest children through three years of age will look for eggs on the playground and children four years of age through 5th grade will look for eggs on the front grounds. When the children have found their seven eggs they will bring their eggs to the sidewalk by the RE door to turn them in and select

seven items. *In order to plan for this special event, please let me know if your family will be participating and the number of children. Parents will need to supervise.*

Please welcome **Vivian White** to our childcare staff! She is caring for our children in the 2 & 3 year old room. Vivian is a student at Ball State University studying Psychology and Counseling. She has been attending the Unitarian Universalist Church of Muncie for a total of 4 1/2 years this spring.

The Buy It Now feature will be active! If you love an offering and don't want to compete in the bidding process, just "Buy It Now" and it is yours!

### April 17 – “The 2022 IPCC Reports: Grim Forecasts Plus Glimmers of Hope” David LeBlanc

The UN-sponsored IPCC (Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change) is now publishing its latest reports. According to IPCC Co-Chair Hans-Otto Portner, *“The scientific evidence is unequivocal . . . Any further delay in concerted global action will miss a brief and rapidly closing window to secure a livable future.”* The discussion leader will be David LeBlanc, Ball State Prof. of Biology with – this is surely relevant – a 2-year-old granddaughter named Aurelia.

### April 24 – “The Climate Crisis and Youth”

Youth in this context means young – middle-school, high-school, and college students, also 20- and 30-somethings. It’s not clear that older folks can really “empathize.” The survival of children and youth is at stake. Period. Thus, it’s logical that their leadership is the most determined and, probably, most effective. We have one good prospect for a leader who is also in touch with those youth in our region who might Zoom in and speak for themselves. Stay tuned.

congregational polity. Some of you have heard me speak of the 'big-picture' view of congregational life, divided between Governance and Ministry --- between financial and operational matters, and programs for faith development. As a Board is to Governance, a Council is to Ministry. (For more on this model of organization, see Dan Hotchkiss, *Governance and Ministry: Rethinking Board Leadership* (Lanham: Rowman & Littlefield, 2016).

The UUCM Board has agreed with my recommendation to lay groundwork to change the focus of the council from "program" to "leadership development." As in the past, the vice-president of the Board chairs the Leadership Council, serving as liaison between Council and Board. The purpose of a Leadership Council is two-fold: 1) to expand skills in the art of leadership to folks already serving as chairs of committees and teams, and 2) to provide leadership training to others in the congregation not already on the council who are interested in future leadership positions such as on the Board. We now have a wealth of online leadership development materials produced by the UUA (see <https://www.uua.org/leaderlab/programs> as one example). Resources abound for any readers of this Unigram interested in knowing more about leadership. Because the Leadership Council helps nurture the next round of elected leaders, this Leadership Development process replaces the more traditional Nominating Committee. All too often, a nominating-committee process is short-term and functional, aimed at identifying elected leaders in the nick of time for the annual spring election, a method which may result in some elected to leadership without training or understanding of roles and responsibilities of their services. I hope you see the advantages of a more on-going Leadership Development method of identifying future leaders of UUCM.

To test the feasibility of this change of focus for the Council, to date we have held two meetings of an emerging Leadership Council, with eight of UUCM's committee at the table. To ground this new activity, I have been sharing leadership of the Council with Board V-P Joseph Kaplan. The format of meetings includes

conversation about practical tips for leadership for the committee chairs present; followed by an "educational" component such as watching and then discussing topics in leadership found on the UUA website; and finally conversation about how UUCM committees can support one another. Future conversations for the Leadership Council include planning a volunteer fair for early September to enhance volunteering at UUCM, and collaborative planning of the all-church calendar for the coming church year. Indeed, this emerging Leadership Council embodies important awakening to new habits of organization at UUCM. When UUCM engages in its next round of By-Law revisions, the By-Laws will reflect this new name and new function of this important Council. Do you also know that, through excellent mentoring from the UUCM Committee on Ministry (Jamie Butterbaugh, chair; Bill Frederick; Aryn Sweeney; Denise Ewing; Tim Hollems) UUCM now has a new Membership Committee!!!! Everyone, give a Shout-Out to Tim Hollems, Adrienne Gruver, Ben Ewing, and Rachel Coers who have stepped up to serve in this important membership role!!!! Formed a few months ago, this new team is approaching oversight of membership wisely, taking on responsibilities gradually, so as to not create the overwhelm experienced by a previous membership committee. Their first responsibility is as greeters for Sunday morning in-person worship: you remember, those smiling faces who welcome back old-timers and make

experience the wonder that leads to awakening, so much the better.

(2) Along my little stretch of ocean—the part of the shore that lies most directly behind our house in Florida—there is an intriguing phenomenon that occurs. It happens in the morning when the tide is coming in, very early, before sunrise. The several sandbars that run northward from there make for a lot of wave action, and hence sound. But there is a moment, a bare second, when if I'm listening closely, the sound ceases utterly. There is the most profound silence I have ever heard (if one can hear silence!). Between the crash of the waves on the shore and their receding back into the sea which offered them up, there is a silence so deep that it never fails to awaken my spirit to an extraordinary reality. There is a yogic breathing technique called Ocean Breathing or Ujjayi Breath, that to some extent replicates this [How to Do Ocean Breath \(Ujjayi Pranayama\) in Yoga \(verywellfit.com\)](#). The pause between the in-breath and the out-breath is a moment of profound silence. I invite you to try it.

(3) Christians and some UUs as well celebrate Easter this month, and my third snapshot comes from one Christian account of Easter. The story of the road to Emmaus comes from the Book of Luke in the Christian New Testament (Luke 24:13-43). Two people walking along a road met up with a third whom they didn't recognize. The stranger inquired into what they were discussing, and they recounted for him the story of Jesus' crucifixion and the subsequent account of the empty tomb. As he accompanied them on their walk, the stranger retold the Hebrew Scriptures account of the coming of the Messiah. It grew late and the two invited the stranger to have supper with them. As recorded in *The Message* biblical paraphrase, "He sat down at the table with them. Taking the bread, he blessed and broke and gave it to them. At that moment, open-eyed, wide-eyed, they recognized him. And then he disappeared." This encounter, the simple act of sharing a meal, awakened them to a reality they had not been able to comprehend before.

(4) We've looked at two snapshots of awakening from the natural world and one from the Christian tradition.

I'll turn now to one from Buddhist psychologist and author the late John Welwood, who encourages us to look within as we seek to awaken. Welwood's poem comes from *Soul Matters* and is titled "Forget about Enlightenment" ([Forget about Enlightenment by John Welwood \(Mindfulness Poetry\) \(soulfularogya.com\)](#)):

Sit down wherever you are  
And listen to the wind singing in your veins.  
Feel the love, the longing, the fear in your bones.  
Open your heart to who you are, right now,  
Not who you would like to be,  
Not the saint you are striving to become,  
But the being right here before you, inside you, around you.  
All of you is holy.  
You are already more and less  
Than whatever you can know.  
Breathe out,  
Touch in,  
Let go.

Welwood's poem could as well be titled "Forget about Awakening," it seems to me. To awaken, we can sink into the present, open ourselves to what is, and let go. That's all. Breathe.
