An Introduction, a Reintroduction, or a Re-Reintroduction to our Acting Minister

Depending on how long you've been part of UUCM, this piece might be an introduction, a reintroduction, or a re-reintroduction. I grew up in southeast Wisconsin. Since leaving Wisconsin for graduate school in the early 1990s, I've lived in Texas, Georgia, Washington, and now Indiana. My wife, Lee Ann Powell, and I, own a mid-century house on a 1.3 acre forested property in Richmond. We've been together since 2008. Lee Ann is the head of academic advising at the Richmond branch of Ivy Tech. We share our home with a widower bunny, four guinea pigs, and nine cats—all adoptees, and all with Roman and Norse mythological names. My first career was as a professor of history and religion. My academic specialty was in new and alternative religions of Africa and the African Diaspora. Lee Ann and I both left academia in 2015 for new ventures. I've been thinking a lot about this coming church year. And I'm excited, hopeful, and invigorated! I will admit I've been feeling a bit frayed around the edges. Staffing changes, uncertainty in so many areas, things just not being "normal," continued constraints imposed by the pandemic not being over, not seeing as many of you in church in person, lack of personal contact among us staff... And that's just here at UUCM.

But I sense strongly that change is in the air. The tune and lyrics of the Easter hymn, "Lo, the Earth Awakes Again" have been running through my head. I'm feeling a real sense of *awakening*, of throwing off some of the cloudy pall that I expect we've all felt at some time

over the last few years. And it feels wonderful, positive, and promising.

We are indeed coming back together, too. I'm seeing more and more of you in person on Sunday mornings, while we're also working on ways to help our remote congregants feel integrated with the whole. We'll be a multiplatform congregation for the foreseeable future, and keeping both contingents connected is essential to coming back together. Committees are beginning to meet more in person, with less reliance on Zoom. We're planning for in-person staff meetings on a regular schedule. As of the last Sunday in July, that venerable institution, our post-service coffee hour, is back!

August 7 – "The Power of Community" Bibi Bahrami

Bibi Bahrami started in the Muncie community as a refugee herself and has been supporting Afghan women and children through her organization AWAKEN (Afghan Women's and Kids' Education & Needs) for the last twenty years. Bibi will discuss how MARRC (Muncie Afghan Refugee Resettlement Committee) began and how the organization has succeeded and resettled over a hundred refugees with the support of the community in the last year.

August 14 – "A Brief History of our Seven Principles" Rev. Dennis McCarty

The Seven Principles are a hot topic these days, as congregations discuss whether to add an 8th Principle. Our summer theme calls us to "come together" in order to "go forward." In that spirit, it helps any discussion of our Principles to know their deep history.

Born in western Colorado, Dennis McCarty decided at age 7 he wanted to become a novelist. He did have several fantasy novels published by Ballantine/Del Rey in the 1980's, but was increasingly hearing a call to liberal ministry. He graduated from Meadville Lombard Theological School in 2003, served his parish Internship at People's Church, and was called to the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Columbus, Indiana. He retired in 2015 and is now their Minister Emeritus.

Over the years he has written novels, songs, nonfiction books, plays, and magazine articles—and *lots* of sermons. Since retiring from the parish, he has been answering a slightly different call, to share words and music related to his evolving sense of spirituality. His book, *Reflections: on Time, Culture, and Spirits in America*, was published in April, 2018. His latest book *Sherlock Holmes at the Siege of Troy*, returns to his fantasy roots. His current book project, *The Celluloid Periscope: Movies as Windows into America's Soul*, will be published in 2023.

Splinters from the Board

At the first meeting of the new Board of Trustees in July, each person spent five minutes speaking about their wishes and dreams for the congregation in the coming year. It turns out that the Board's collective wishes closely parallel the Developmental Ministry Goals for 2022–2027, which the previous Board authored. These five goals, paraphrased for reasons of space, are:

- 1. increase trust, mutual respect, and encouragement in the congregation
- 2. optimize our use of both professional staff and volunteers
- 3. reinvigorate our social-justice advocacy and engagement with the community
- 4. deepen our understanding of religious histories and diversity within the congregation
- 5. create plans to care for our building and preserve it for future generations

Here are some of my thoughts about these goals.

I encourage everyone in the congregation to be conscious of your tone when you are communicating with others. If you are irritated, angry, or hurt, try to find a way to express that emotion so that you disarm the conflict and lower the tension rather than the opposite. Re-read your e-mails before you hit "send." Resolve to be part of the solution to distrust and disrespect rather than part of the problem.

The Board will do a staff analysis through the Mid-America Region: we will be analyzing staff hours and considering whether or not the church might be better served by shifting those hours and tweaking job descriptions. The Committee on Ministries will be studying our various committees to be sure we are making the best use of our volunteer hours.

When our forebears built the downtown Universalist church, they wanted it to have "a steeple taller than any other church in town." We should aspire through our social-justice work to have a metaphorical steeple higher than that of any other church. Let's all think of ways that our congregation can become more engaged with the community of Muncie and east-central Indiana. What can we do as a congregation, not just as individuals, to make a positive difference?

Our diversity of beliefs is a source of strength for us. When you are attending church on Zoom, look at the people in the boxes surrounding yours; when you attend in person, look at those seated around you. Be aware that each of those individuals likely has a religious background and views different from yours. Let's find ways, informally and through small-group ministry, to find out more about each other's beliefs and experiences.

Our building is more than 55 years old. The HVAC system is outdated. Some parts of the building and property (if you look at them with an outsider's eyes) are not very attractive. Our small Property Maintenance Committee works hard to repair and maintain the building, but it is a huge task. We need a long-range plan and considerable financial investment to address the needs of our aging building.

Do you have ideas about how we can work together toward these goals? I'd like to hear them! Talk to me, or to another Board member.

UUCM's August Dedicated offering goes to support AWAKEN (Afghan Women's and Kids' Education & Needs). AWAKEN's founder, Bibi Bahrami, will be the presenter of the Sunday service on August 7. Here's some information from our recipient's website www.awaken.org:

The Afghan people are going through immense difficulties, left without food and basic necessities of daily living.

While many Afghans have been able to find refuge and new homes, many more are left behind. We plan to continue serving the Afghan people to the best of our ability while also maintaining safety. We continue to provide emergency relief including a recent food distribution. We also continue to run our Behsood Health Clinic, the Birthing Center, and the Mobile Clinic!! This included a few adjustments to comply with national policies. Our vocational centers are on hold at this time.

We have also shifted some of our funding and efforts towards helping Afghans leave Afghanistan and resettle in new countries, including the U.S. This includes Muncie, Indiana through our new sub-organization – MARRC (Muncie Afghan Refugee Resettlement Committee).

MARRC pledges to support each Afghan family for 6 months so they can get their feet under them, find jobs, and establish themselves as a thriving part of our community. This commitment will require an exceptional fundraising effort from all of us. Help us build a future together with our new neighbors. Since the appropriate people were notified in the appropriate order, Rev. Joel and I have been emailing about how we'll organize our working together this year. Not all of that is in place yet; it will likely be a work in progress for some time. Having Rev. Joel on board is a significant aspect of going forward as a congregation. He brings a demeanor and a perspective that I believe will be helpful as we seek healing and move forward. It's also the thing that most directly affects my ministry.

I want to use the rest of my column this month to clarify what that looks like for my role with you all. Here's what I know right now. As Rev. Joel mentioned in his brief greeting the last Sunday in July, he will be preaching the 1st and 3rd Sundays of the month. I will preach regularly on the fourth Sunday of every month, a change that I look forward to eagerly. I will also assume full responsibility for pastoral care at UUCM. I'll be the "minister for pastoral care," as Rev. Joel put it, working with our Pastoral Associates to provide seamless pastoral care with and for all our beloved community. This all is an amazing and very welcome opportunity for me. I will be curtailing some other responsibilities (e.g., guest preaching) to maintain my focus on these two significant ministries.

There's a lot of change happening. Let's remember the basics: self-care, grace for ourselves and each other, assume good intentions, live in the present, look toward the future, and ask what's *possible*, rather than rehashing what's been wrong.
