The pandemic brought its own miseries, and exposed the shortcomings of the Trump administration and the inequalities that made the pandemic worse for people of color and those in poverty. The pandemic remains on-going, as do its variety of economic and social dislocations. While each of us were impacted by the pandemic and trumpism in different ways, no one escaped it.

No manual existed for how to remain a functioning church community during quarantine. For the most part, there were only wrong answers. Whatever choices are made about online church, then hybrid church, or what kind of safety policies and masking to follow, it always creates some people who are happy and others who are unhappy. Some people took their extra anxiety out on their staff, lay leaders, and one another. I too have been guilty of misdirecting my anxiety. It's important to regularly

I am writing before the October 23 congregational meeting, and I have no Board business to discuss, so here is an item of all-church fun and games instead.

I spent the weekend of October 13–16 up at Pokagon State Park with forty-some other UUs at the annual fall retreat that our congregation organizes. I was part of the early crew that did the shopping and the initial food preparation for the weekend before Friday night, which is when most people rolled in.

The Group Camp at Pokagon, which we took over for the weekend, consists of a central building that comprises a dining hall, a commercial kitchen, a small multi-purpose room, and a single unisex bathroom; three heated buildings with multiple bunk beds in them; twelve unheated cabins; and a men's and women's bathhouse. The camp is right on Lake James, with spectacular views at sunset. And the fall leaves were at their peak on this particular weekend.

A few people took a pass on the bunk beds and midnight walks to the bathhouse, and opted instead for the posh accommodations at the Potawatami Inn (also in the park).

The UU "retreat" is an unstructured event. People come together three times a day for meals, but otherwise do as they please. Some of us hiked. Others played games and worked on jigsaw puzzles in the dining hall. Others sat around a fire and

remind ourselves to find healthy channels for the extra anxiety these trying times are bringing us—as individuals and as communities.

This issue remains an on-going one in churches. It is simply not possible to address covid in a way that will make everyone in a congregation happy. Please appreciate that your board and your staff are doing the best we can at a difficult time. Decisions don't come easy because we have competing demands being made of us from a variety of perspectives. For some our covid measures have been too strict, and for others too lax. If you don't see your desires reflected in our safety measures or the kind of services we're having—whether in the past, the present, or potentially in the future—please know that no one is ignoring your perspective. It's simply that we are hearing about and weighing a range of concerns and perspectives from a variety of viewpoints. Some of those interests are not compatible with one another. Not all of them can carry the day.

This is the challenge and promise of community. Balancing individual wants and needs amid the many is often difficult. But it is doing that hard work to find a way forward, amid our differing interests and wishes, that provides the promise. That promise provides a synergy between community and individuals that contributes to us all being our best selves, and helping others be their best selves.

Before, during, and after these things, this congregation has done a lot and been through a lot in the past decade. In addition to putting on a service every week, the Bazaar, an annual Stewardship campaign, caring for the building, and on the list could go of the usual and on-going things we do, UUCM also created: an experiment with two services, a Mission and Vision, a Building and Grounds visioning project, Long Range plan, small groups, listening sessions, more than one covenant, a grievance process...and this list is not exhaustive. Additionally, this congregation has had four different ministers and four different staff people for religious education over that time.

When we consider what has happened politically, followed by all the dislocation and tragedy of the pandemic, internal tensions about covid measures,

combined with everything this congregation has done and experienced in the past decade, it is no mystery to me why some of us are feeling anxious, or strained, or fatigued, or even depleted.

For individuals and organizations, is it healthy to engage in self-reflection, to reform, to strive for growth and change? Of course is it. But consider this. Is it also not important to do those things at the right time and for the right reasons? There are times when it is not just perfectly acceptable and healthy, but in fact the best option, to say lots of things are demanding our attention right now, our internal resources are strained, and we've got fewer people attending than we used to. I feel this is a time we would be best served to give ourselves permission to reduce our concern with revision and reform and put some of those things off for another day. Sometimes we need to love who we are and not worry so much about who we might become. Rest and renewal is no less important than revision and reform.

I'm not suggesting that we procrastinate or bury or heads in the sand and ignore what needs doing. We do have some important work to do together, and I look forward to that. What I am saying is that there are times—and I think we're in one of those times right now—when it is ok for a congregation to be happy with who and what we are and celebrate that. There is much to love right here and right now. This is why I felt a need to create a slogan for our church year together. I wanted something for us to rally around, to celebrate, and to promote our self-love. Because we totally should be in love with ourselves; there is lots to love! In all the time I've know this place and the people in it, I've witnessed generosity, kindness, and compassion for others and our planet. I've witnessed people living their values and creating a better world. It is a pleasure and honor to be a part of this group of Unitarian Universalists. And that is what I 💜 about UUCM and all of you.
