Rev. Dr. Julia Corbett-Hemeyer, Community Minister

When Rev. Joel suggested I link my December *Unigram* column to the I ❤️ UUCM idea he had initiated, I was excited about doing so. It proved to be an uplifting and encouraging endeavor. As I read the sentiments we had expressed on the hearts, I felt confident that we have what it takes to move forward. Here's some of what I learned.

There was a single theme that emerged most often, though in different forms, winding like a crystal stream through so many of the feelings and thoughts: UUCM provides a *safe space*, a haven that "feels like home." It's a place where "kids and teens" can explore their own values with accepting adults and other kids. We're encouraged to explore our own beliefs, rather than learning someone else's creed. We also affirm morality and ethics without a creed. We are a welcoming community. As one writer said, "the church gave me a place to belong when I needed it most." It is a "sanctuary," a "family away from family."

Our people make us what we are for many. "Special people come here, and we welcome them all heartily." We're "rebellious people who make

The Board of Trustees and the search committee for our next minister will be holding a series of Town-Hall Meetings to get feedback from the congregation, and to inform the congregation, about the ministerial search.

Rev. Joel Tishken has told the Board that he would like to be considered a candidate for our ministerial position. Members of the Board welcome this news—we are glad that Rev. Joel feels positive about the UU Church of Muncie, as we also feel positive about him. Any time a search to fill a position has an internal candidate, there is the possibility for awkwardness at best, and hurt feelings at worst. But we believe that both can be

history.” “We can laugh, we can cry, we can sing together.” We’re an open-minded people, according to many responses. “Acceptance” is a word that I read often. And we are kind. We are a *community*. We’re a “place where people respect others and love them for who they are.” We’re accepted for who we are, as we are, but also encouraged to grow. One person offered this summary: “great people, good food, good times.”

As I would have expected, people mentioned music often, both Jim’s piano artistry and our choir. People highlighted the importance we place on service to others and helping the planet. They expressed affection for our woods, our little piece of the planet.

In his November *Unigram* column, Rev. Joel wrote:

Sometimes we need to love who we are and not worry so much about who we might become. Rest and renewal is no less important than revision and reform... What I am saying is that there are times—and I think

we’re in one of those times right now—when it is ok for a congregation to be happy with who and what we are and celebrate that. There is much to love right here and right now.

Our heartfelt responses to why we ♥ UUCM bear this out. There is indeed much love right here, right now. Many of us have felt battered and bruised by the national scene marked by Trumpism, militant conservatism, racism and many other things that violate our most deeply cherished values, and covid with its anxieties and quarantines. We’ve also been hurt by events within our congregation. May we, while we look toward the future and what we might yet be with eagerness and anticipation, take time to embrace and celebrate who we are and who we have continued to be in the face of substantial odds.

avoided or minimized if the search is conducted in an open and above-board way.

In our November 1 meeting, the Board agreed that the minister for the next several church years should be a developmental minister. We don't think much has changed in the congregation's situation in the year or so since we had a congregation-wide discussion and agreed to search for a developmental minister. We also don't think that the congregation is ready to do a full search for a settled minister. We would like to see some of our past divisions recede a little further in the rear-view mirror, and we would like to make more progress on our developmental goals, before calling a settled minister.

Also in our November meeting, the Board agreed that there should be a genuine search for our (possibly) new minister, including consideration of the candidates the UUA sends our way. The search committee must identify, and the Board must hire, the best-qualified person available for the job. In order to do so, we must be open to a wide variety of possibilities and we must rigorously scrutinize multiple candidates.

I have been asked a few times, "Why can't we just hire Rev. Joel and not bother with a search?" I believe that approach has too much of an attitude of just making do with what we have. The Board has a fiduciary responsibility to find the best possible minister for the position and I believe that means doing a search. If Rev. Joel is the best possible minister for the position, then we will hire him.

I have also been asked, "What is a developmental minister, and how is that different from a settled minister?" A developmental minister (DM) is a fairly new concept in UU circles. In the future there will likely be more specialized training for DMs, but right now applicants for DM positions are likely to have trained either to be settled ("regular") ministers or interim ministers—and indeed they will probably apply for those other sorts of positions as well as for DM ones.

The big difference between a DM and a settled minister is that the DM is hired by the board, not "called" by the entire congregation after an intensive weeklong visit. The DM is hired to a contract of three to five years (renewable), or to a series of one-year contracts, and it is understood that their role is, in addition to doing all the other jobs of a minister, to help the congregation work on particular areas that the congregation has identified as needing growth or change.

Just to review, our five developmental goals (identified by the previous Board last year) are:

1. increase trust, mutual respect, and encouragement in the congregation
2. optimize our use of both professional staff and volunteers
3. reinvigorate our social-justice advocacy and engagement with the community
4. deepen our understanding of religious histories and diversity within the congregation
5. create plans to care for our building and preserve it for future generations

(I have shortened and paraphrased somewhat for reasons of space.)

A DM is a *real* minister. Working on the developmental goals is only a part of their job. Like any minister, they are tasked with leading Sunday worship, providing pastoral care, working with the Board to provide leadership to the congregation, serving as the public face of the congregation, acting as chief of staff, and probably more tasks that I'm forgetting about!

There is lots more to say about our search for a developmental minister. Let's have some conversations at the Town Hall Meetings later this month.
