Hi, Barbie!

A couple weeks ago, my daughter and I went to see the Barbie movie. (This is not a review, but we both loved it.) Whether you've seen it or not, the movie has been inescapable. Press, commercials, advertisements- it's the summer of Barbie. As of this week, the movie has broken seventeen box office records and Greta Gerwig, who directed and cowrote the film, just became the first woman to have a film cross the billion-dollar mark. All of that made me fall down a little bit of a Greta Gerwig-shaped internet rabbit-hole. I knew that she was responsible for writing and directing two of my favorite movies, Ladybird and Little Women. What I didn't know was that she is a Unitarian Universalist and grew up attending the Unitarian Universalist Society of Sacramento.

Gerwig was interviewed for the Fall 2013 issue of UU World about her movie, *Frances Ha*, and the decision to include the congregation the UU Society of Sacramento in the film. She discusses growing up in the church and how Unitarian Universalism continues to be a part of her life. In one section, she concedes that her parents left their congregation in the 1990s but have since returned. She explains this by saying "my mom likes to say that having a time of a 'walkabout' is almost part of being a Unitarian." As a person who also took a "walkabout" of sorts and found my way back to the church, that struck a chord with me. It's a bit of a romantic idea, right? Like finding your way back to your soulmate or something.

On the other hand, as a person who has spent a lot of time thinking about our retention rate at UUCM and how to get people to return again, I have questions. If this idea of a walkabout is inherently part of the UU journey, where is everyone? When



are they coming back? Or, to frame it differently, why aren't they coming back? Some of it is life circumstances, for sure. But that can't be the only reason people are walking away instead of having a "walkabout." In the movie, Barbie ventures off on her own before returning to Barbieland; that trip helps her to realize that the shared values and support she took for granted isn't something she can find elsewhere. She comes to realize that the people she surrounded herself with are what makes Barbieland special.

In the end, much like ending up with "the one who got away," it doesn't seem that realistic to me to assume the majority of people who've walked away from church are going to find their way back on their own. Maybe, like Barbie, they need some help getting back to where they were before. Like the residents of Barbieland, the people of UUCM offer a set of shared values and a support system that many can't find outside of this church community. As we get ready for our church Homecoming, let's all take some time to reach out and say "Hi, Barbie" to the people we haven't seen in a while. We might not have a choreographed dance number to perform, but we can remind them of all the other awesome things we do here!

Talk with Your Mouth Full!

Some of you may remember **Dinner Discussion Groups** from the pre-COVID days. Those participating in the DDGs were assigned to a group of 6–8 people, who then met monthly throughout the church year, sharing a meal and conversation. The "discussions" could be somewhat organized, with a topic announced in advance by the host(s), or they could be entirely freewheeling.

It is time to sign up again: between now and the end of September there is a sign-up sheet posted in the SE corner of the sanctuary.

Dinner Discussion Groups are a terrific way to build and deepen our community. The meals are typically "organized potlucks"—and they don't need to be confined to evening dinners. Gatherings are usually in members' homes, but can be at the church or at other locations. Duties of hosting/organizing the gatherings rotate through the group. (These are principally adult gatherings; inclusion of children should be negotiated within the group.)

Eleanor Trawick and **Andy Seager** are organizing the groups this year. We hope that those who have been in dinner discussion groups before will sign up again, and we particularly encourage those who are new to the church, or to Dinner Discussion Groups, to give it a try.

Pastoral Care is "primarily a ministry of intentional and faithful presence." (Francesca Nuzzolese, pastoral theologian, counselor). My intention is to be that "intentional and faithful presence" insofar as I am able at any given time. To hold space for whatever is happening in your life. To be a grounded and grounding presence as we walk together through the joys and troubles of your life and our shared life in this beloved community. Pastoral conversations don't have to be reserved for life's big challenges, either. We can share joys as well as concerns, large and small.

As I see it, pastoral care takes place within a larger context of care. Rev. Joel and I bring our professional expertise and training to this larger context. Our Pastoral Associates provide additional diversity and participate in ongoing training to enhance their ministry. The Caring Committee works closely with the Pastoral Associates to provide meals or transportation to those who need temporary assistance. What we can call "parish care" is another dimension. We have numerous affinity groups such as the choir, the adult discussion group, and our connection groups. In addition to their particular foci, however, their members provide additional care and support for one another. Finally, and very important, one of the major strengths of our whole congregation is the mutual care and concern we offer one another. All these dimensions work together to create a very caring and supportive congregation.

Let's get down to the "how" of it. My primary responsibility is to provide pastoral care for our congregation and staff. I'm available to provide a pastoral presence and counsel in response to requests and as I reach out to folks in our congregation. I visit members and friends of the congregation in hospitals and extended care facilities. I can help plan and officiate for rites of passage as requested as well.

This primary responsibility leads to other things, such as leading the Joys and Concerns segment of Sunday services and facilitating our Pastoral Associates team. My writing for our *Unigram* and Friday *eBlast* focuses primarily on pastorally-oriented topics. I preach about six times a year and assist with special services as requested.

As time allows, I also represent UUCM in the larger UU world through writing, attendance at meetings, and guest speaking engagements. I also provide pastoral services to members of the larger community on occasion.

I will continue to take my usual eight-week sabbatical in January through March for study, creative work, and self-care. I take one Sunday a month off, on average. As has been the case, I will be available remotely while I am away, via phone, text, email and Zoom, as well as writing.

As a general reminder, I currently don't have scheduled office hours on site. My current office hours are by appointment. Typically, I'm available by phone or Zoom (requires prior arrangement for the link) any time during the day between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., except Friday and Sunday afternoons and Mondays, and can also schedule in-person meetings during those hours. For pastoral emergencies, of course call any time. Please leave a message with your name and phone number if there is no answer.
